Canada Grows New Town Every Year

Next Six Months Will See an Average of a Municipality Every Twenty-Hours Brought into Being—Novel Movement to Eliminate Insanity.

(From our own Correspondent)
Montreal, May 27.—By the end of the coming summer there will be at least 170 new towns in Canada, not counting those which come into existence gradually and in the course of evolution from clusters of houses, into hamlets and then into towns. The 170 will all be in the West—the great, the glorious West. Not for them the humdrum processes of conventional development; they will spring, full-panoplied, into being, with hotels, court-houses, jails and all the modern improvements, on paper, and a small railroad station, a mile or so of siding and unbounded hope and confidence in the future as actual assets. The Canadian Pacific will be responsible for 50 of them, the Grand Trunk Pacific for 24, and the Canadian Northern for 96. It is a fair supposition that all of them will live because of the fostering care of their railroad and that most of them will prosper because the time has come for towns to succeed farms at selected locations on the prairie, and the railroads are in a better position to do the selecting than any other instrumentality except land companies. Nor will these railroad towns be the only communities to come into being in the West in the next three or four months, but from their number it is possible to draw some kind of an impression of the method and the speed of Western development.

NO MORE INSANITY

Insanity as a defence in murder trials which has become so common of late years may eventually be eliminated as the result of a novel movement just started here. Figures have been gathered which show that in this city alone there are 2,000 feeble-minded children, many of whom will inevitably become members of the criminal class. Statistics show that crime and insanity are on the increase and that fully half the criminals are criminals because of mental and nervous conditions which obtained during childhood. Accordingly it is now proposed to catch the potential criminals suffering from some mental or nervous disorder while they are young and cure them before it becomes too late. To this end it is planned to establish here an institution where feeble-minded children shall be examined and registered since if the condition is recognized soon enough the child can generally be cured. Under the present system the procedure is to send mentally deficient children to a reformatory, from which they are released in a few months, often worse than they were before entering. Under the new plan they will not be released until they are cured. If this proposal does succeed in eliminating the overworked defense of insanity in criminal cases, it is not improbable that a long suffering public will be willing to erect a monument to its sponsor.

CONFLAGRATIONS NUMEROUS

Fire alarms have been far in excess this year in comparison with the same period of last year. Since the 1st of January, 855 runs were made by the various divisions of the fire brigade, up to the 1st of May while during the same period in 1910 the total number was only 638. Up to the 1st of June, last year the runs made numbered only 907.

Mr. Wm. Jennings Bryan Commends the Canadian Government Annuities Scheme

A prophet is without honor in his own country. As with prophets, so it is with the natural advantages which a country enjoys, and those acquired advantages which are obtained under its laws and its customs—it often needs the eye of the outsider to discover the striking benefits of some institution with which the people are blessed.

The earnest tribute paid to the Canadian Government Annuities system by Mr. Wm. Jennings Bryan during his address to the citizens of Galt, on Friday last, should do much to determine the question for those who have not yet taken advantage of the system, the opinion coming, as it does, from one who has made the social problem a life study. He is reported to have said: "I have been trying for years to figure out a similar scheme for the benefit of the citizens of the United States and I cannot understand why every civilized country does not follow the lead of Canada and encourage the people to put something by for the day when they will be too old to work. This is true co-operative Government," he added. While other countries have established pension schemes, which are but poor extensions of Poor Law Relief, the result of which is to pauperize, and not to stimulate thrift, the Canadian Government has, by its Annuity Act, inaugurated a scheme whereby thrift is promoted, and the people are provided with facilities which will enable them to help themselves, and at the same time preserve their self-respect and dignity.

Potato Scab

This disease causes the familiar blackened, pocket-like cavities and roughened corky spots on the skin of the potato. In this way the scale and appearance of the potatoes are injured. On the surface of the spots, numerous small spores or germs are produced, which remain attached to the potato or in the soil over winter and when these potatoes are again planted the scab again forms on the new tubers. Disinfect your seed potatoes by soaking them thoroughly for two hours in a solution made by putting ½ pint of 40% formalin in 15 gallons of water, then spread them out on a clean floor to dry. Do not fertilize your ground with fresh manure from stock fed on scabby potatoes. Avoid using such fertilizers as lime and wood ashes because they seem to afford a favorable condition for the growth of the disease.
