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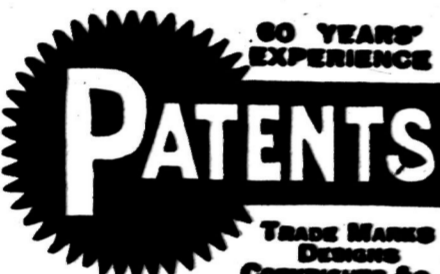

Will Take The Census

The Census Staff of Haldimand County and Indian Reserve-District No. 75-5th Census of Canada. June 1st, 1911-J. W. Sheppard, Commissioner, Cayuga.

J. W. Sheppard, the Census Commissioner for Haldimand held a school of instruction for the enumerators who will do the actual work. There are fifty of them altogether. Their duties will begin Thursday morning, June 1, and they are to prosecute the same with all reasonable diligence until their divisions have been covered. The actual moment used as a basis upon which the enumerating will be done is mid-night of May 31st. Any child born after that hour will not be counted, while a person dying between then and the day the enumerator calls will be counted as if alive. There are upward to 300 questions to be answered when a complete set of the schedules have to be used. Below is the list of enumerators for Haldimand:

When the census man calls in June you will be asked a great many questions.

Schedule No. 1 comprises the population by name, personal description, etc., and the following questions will appear on the census paper: Name of each person in family, place of habitation, sex, relationship, whether single, married, divorced, or legally separated, month of birth, and age of last birthday. The following questions as to citizenship, nationality and religion also appear; country or place of birth, year of immigration to Canada, if formerly an alien, racial or tribal origin, nationality and religion. Five questions appear under the heading of profession, occupation or means of livelihood, to which chief occupation or trade, if any, employer, employee, or working on your own account.

You will be asked where you are employed, and if you are a wage earner, what you work at, by the day or hour, what wages you receive, your total earning. If you are insured, the amount on your life and against accidents and sickness and what it cost you. Your education will be looked into. The census man will not be satisfied until you give him all the particulars, but you can rest easy, as he is sworn to secrecy and will be so full of answers that he cannot remember a single thing you tell him after he has written it.

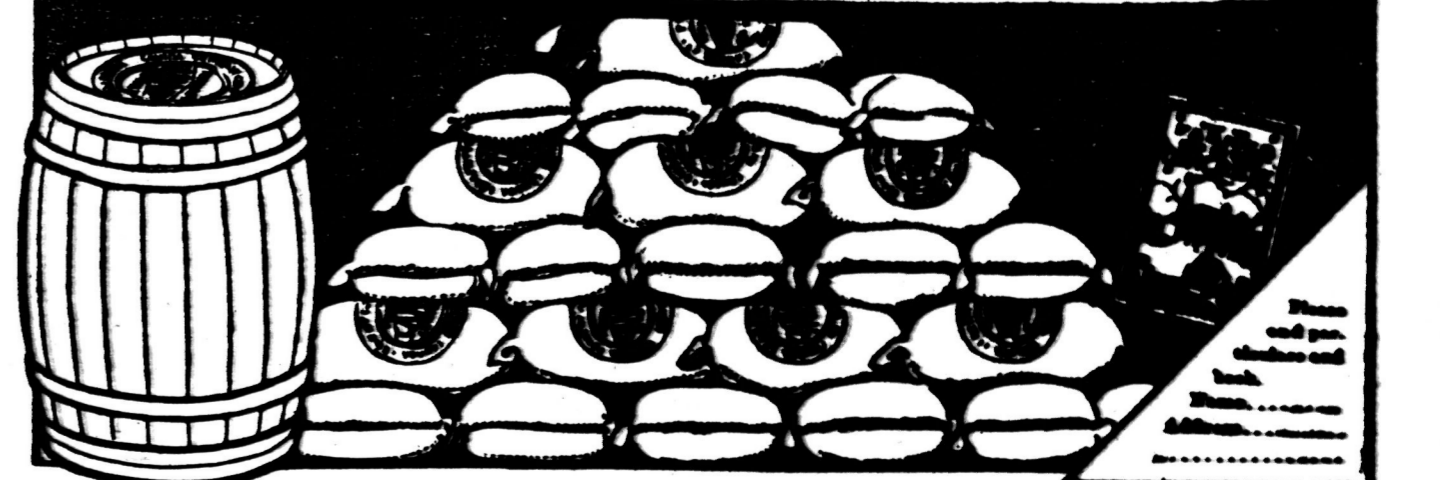
