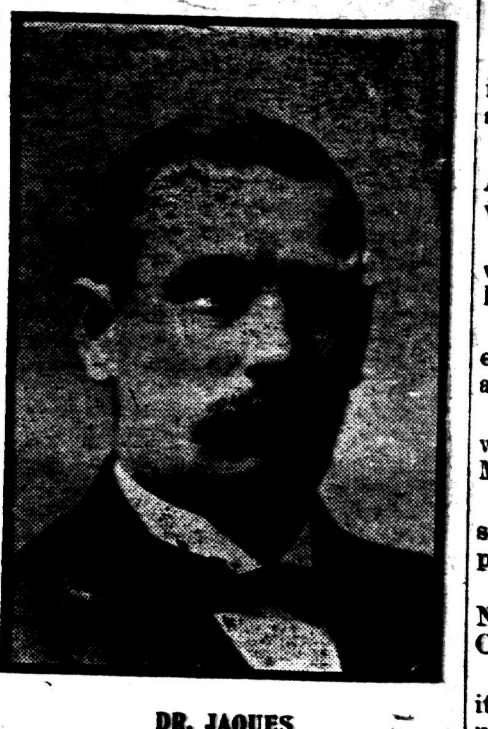

The Business Men.
The hen that is going to do the heavy laying the coming winter was hatched early last spring. During December and January the pullets usually lay about four times as many eggs as an equal number of hens. One of the United States experiment stations made a year's experiment last, beginning with pullets and one and two year-old hens, giving each of the three lots equal advantages. The pullets laid about twice as many eggs as the two year-old hens, while the second lot had a record about half-way between. In rare cases a hen may lay for her keeping after she is two years old.
