22. If the attack is accompanied by aches and fevers, avoid pneumonia by—

24. Decreasing eating.
25. Taking a purge.
26. Taking medical counsel.

The Tragedy of Pauline Johnston

Pauline Johnston, song bird of the red men, will sing no more. Every lover of Canadian literature hears with profoundest regret, that acute heart trouble, with which she has been afflicted for some time has at last forced Miss Johnston into retirement. Her physicians state that the recovery will never be complete, a new again. The daughter of the Five Nations lies out in the city of Vancouver a chronic invalid. And the pity of her illness is that she is in want. Poets are never celebrated for world riches. Canadian poets are no exception. Miss Johnston is as widely read as most Canadian poets. At the possession of no fortune to withstand the demands of doctors and nurse's bills. Recognizing this, the Canadian Woman's Club of Vancouver has generously come to the assistance of a genius whose poems give pleasure to thousands of Canadian homes. A fund has been started to publish a de luxe edition of Miss Johnston's works.

A Source of Trouble

One of the rottenest things that our Dominion Treasury has ever done is the printing of the new issue of the \$4 bill. These \$4 bills, although they have been out for a few weeks have already caused financial loss to a great many people and quarrels and squabbles and law suits to many others. At the present time a law suit is pending in Grimsby where \$27 is claimed by the plaintiff as having been given to the defendant in mistake in change. The plaintiff's clerk claims to have handed nine \$4 bills to the defendant in mistake for nine \$1. Whether the clerk actually did so or not, there is not the least doubt that it could be quite easily done. In selling tickets at the driving park on Thanksgiving Day I took in two \$4 bills and in each case gave back change for a \$1 bill and not till the party tendering the amount had made a kick, did I notice the mistake. The article I wrote designed the bill was an ass. The officer who permitted it to be printed was a fool and the Government should withdraw the issue and destroy it at once. These bills which really look like a \$1 bill on one side and which are really \$4 bills, have been scattered all over the country, and especially so on the few days previous to the election. The only thing the people can do now is to take every bill they get hold of and deposit it and refuse to take them from the bank when receiving money. The officers who allowed this bill to be issued should be dismissed from the public service at once.—Grimsby Independent

New Stamps

Canadian stamps, bearing the effigy of King George will be put on sale by the Post Office Department within a short time. The Dominion postal authorities were not satisfied with the portrait of the King, which was adopted for the British stamps, and which has since been so severely criticised. It was decided to obtain a design for Canada, and this has been done. The new stamp series is said to be an especially handsome one. The designs were submitted to King George, who in the largest stamp collector in the world, and he has sent a cable to Canada approving of the new Canadian series, with this message: "The last formality has been accomplished, and the stamps will now issue as soon as the dies can be cut."

A large heart rather than a large purse; a trained will rather than an overworked brain, worth rather than fame; unyielding deeds rather than fleeting words; power to win souls for Him rather than to win friends for myself; faith rather than doctrines, hope rather than satisfaction, love rather than achievements.

Important Changes in the new School Regulations

Copies of the new regulations and course of study for public and high schools have been distributed by the Education Department. An examination of these reveals a number of important changes.

Grammar is no longer on the course of study for the third classes of the Public school and the course in this subject for fourth classes has been considerably simplified.

The course of geography for all classes in the Public schools has been radically changed; physical, commercial and economic geography is to receive much greater attention than it has received in the past.

An effort is to be made to adopt the course of study in each school to the needs and the special conditions of the locality. In schools with only one teacher the trustee is authorized to substitute for art and nature study one or more of the following subjects: Domestic science, manual training, elementary agriculture. Physical culture is obligatory in all classes of the public schools and a manual will shortly be issued by the Education Department for the guidance of the teacher taking up the subject.

A two years' course of study is outlined for fifth classes. On completing the first year's course a pupil may take an examination which will entitle him to a junior graduation diploma; both these examinations will be conducted by the Education Department and either diploma will admit the pupil to a High school.

The character and scope of the entrance examination is unchanged, but in future it will be known as the Junior High School Entrance examination. This examination loses much of its importance from the fact that there are three other ways of securing admission to a High school, viz: (1) by means of a senior graduation diploma, (2) by means of a senior graduation diploma, and (3) by passing the senior High school Entrance examination. The latter examination admits the candidate to the middle class of the High school.

With a view to securing more favorable weather conditions, the foregoing examinations and also the examination for admission to the faculties of education and the Normal schools are to be completed by the 30th of June.

Under the new regulations the Government grant to the High schools has been reduced by 25% in respect of equipment, school accommodation and salaries.
