If a boy, let's have a boy doll that looks like a good boy, a kiddy boy, a generous boy. Let's give the kiddy a good book. Let's give the little people will soon enough become pessimists or grouches without your helping the bad work along by presenting them with atrocious, impossible, repulsive, ugly replicas of human being in the shape of doll babies.

Don't Believe Evil Reports

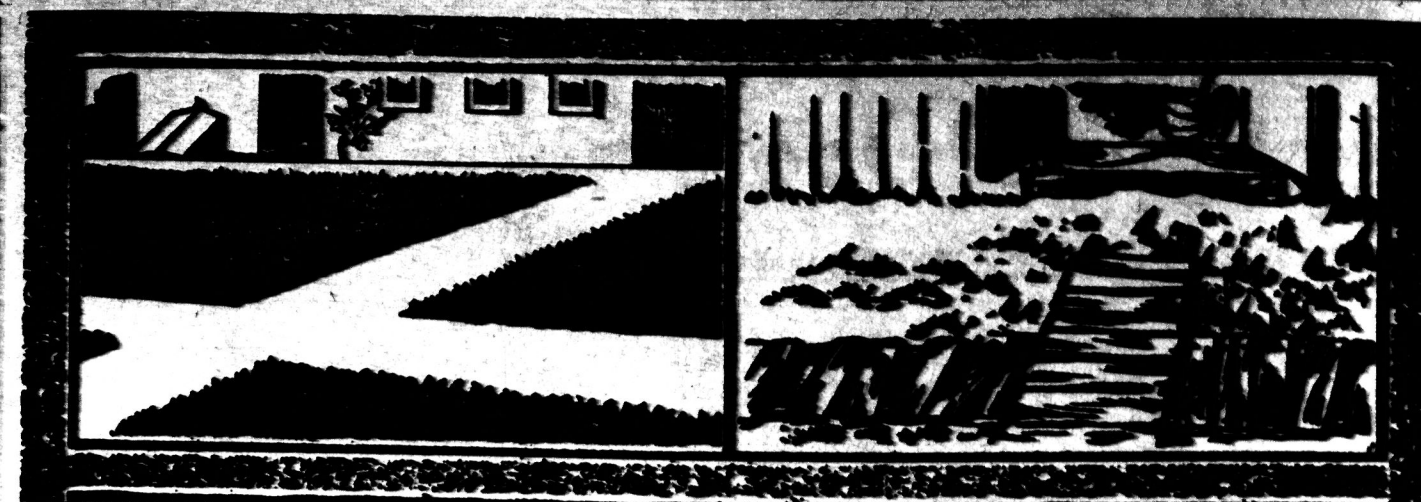

His stern father believed all evil reports of him and cast him off. His people all helped along the "good" work of sending him to perdition by turning the cold shoulder on him. Frozen out on all sides, rebuffed in every attempt to regain his footing, he started to the dogs in earnest. And to the dogs he would have gone, but there came along a sympathetic, pure-minded woman, a pessimist, who enough herself to see the good in others. She believed in him; helped him and started him over again. This is not a love story. She did not marry him. But she made him a fit man for some other woman to marry. Thanks to her faith in him he is now a respected and honored citizen in the West, with a happy wife and children. It is in this story that is not a new one. Many take the wrong road. It is this sublime faith in humanity that gives to a few noble men and women their power for helpfulness. Nothing inspires a man like the knowledge that some believe in us in spite of everything, we will do our best. We will justify that belief. Alma Ladies' College, St. Thomas, Ont.

The Annual Meeting of the Alma College Board on Nov. 21st found the college enjoying unexampled prosperity. The teaching and governing staff is doing most satisfactory work and the classes are exceptionally large. The growing patronage makes necessary early enlargement. It was decided to proceed at the earliest date practicable with the erection of a new gymnasium and hall of class rooms and studies. Electric lighting installation of present buildings is under way. Manual training in wood and metal crafts has been started as auxiliary to departments of fine art and domestic science. The weekly holiday has been changed from Saturday to Monday with much advantage. Principal Warner was appointed delegate to the Imperial Conference of Teachers' Associations to meet in London, Eng., in 1912.

Invitation to the Board, staff, and students at students' social and informal reception, and an address by the President of the Board, Dr. Carmen, were pleasing incidents of the session.

Forestry Notes

LUMBER WASTE FOR PULWOOD. For the purpose of manufacturing the 475,000 tons of wood pulp produced in Canada in 1910 nothing was used except logs of various species, which as our timber supply decreases are becoming valuable for lumber and other uses. No slabs or other sawmill waste was reported as being converted into pulpwood by neglecting which practice, Canada is losing greatly. During 1909 in the United States six per cent of the total pulpwood consumption was from slabs and mill trimmings. If economy had been practiced to the same extent in Canada during 1910, as much pulp might have been produced as from thirty-six thousand cords of wood and not one pulp log need have been cut. This would have made twenty per cent more pulp than Nova Scotia produced in 1910.

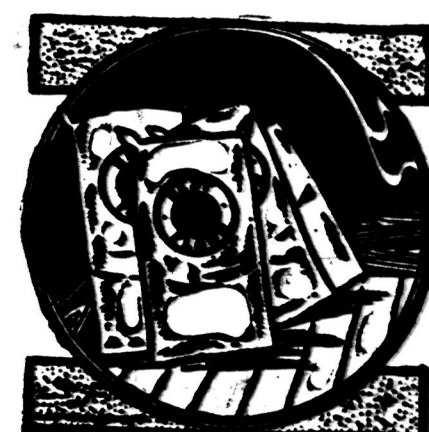
Looking at the subject from another view point the gain might have been much greater. Over one-half of the the five billion feet of the lumber cut in 1910 passed through mills at centre of large population where the slab waste of one-half cord to every thousand feet of lumber might have been saved from the incinerators. One cord of pulpwood will produce at least one-half ton of pulp so that one and a quarter million cords of slabs obtained would have produced at the lowest estimate six hundred and twenty-five thousand tons of pulp. This amount is thirty per cent more than the total of four hundred and seventy-five tons of pulp produced in Canada in 1910. The sooner such practical economy and utilization of wood waste commences the longer will Canada have an adequate supply of pulpwood.
