Sunday School Centennial

Provincial Workers meet in forty-sixth Annual Convention at Brockville, Ont., October 23-28, 1911.

There are more than five thousand Sunday schools in Ontario, almost fifty per cent. of the entire number throughout the Dominion of Canada.

One hundred years ago the first Sunday School in Ontario was organized (Oct. 1811) in the village of Elizabethtown—now Brockville City. The school was organized by Rev. William Swart, who came to this country in response to a call from a Missionary Committee instead of going to India as he had originally planned.

The outgrowth of this Sunday School is the strong and vigorous congregation of the First Presbyterian Church, Brockville. They are housed in a splendid church edifice on the Corner of the City Central Square.

In view of the local celebration in October, which will climax in the holding of the forty-sixth annual convention of the Ontario Sunday School Association, the building has been thoroughly renovated and the organ rebuilt.

A year ago in convention at Ottawa, Ont., the pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, Brockville, Rev. Norman McLeod, backed by the "Brockville and Vicinity" Pastors' Association, urged the claims of Brockville as the next meeting place, and Hamilton City, which had waited one year, already, generously yielded to Brockville's claim.

The Provincial Sunday School Convention at Brockville promises the completion of program ever offered to an Ontario audience. It has several features never before introduced. Hardly a phase of Sunday School interest but finds a place for consideration. Among those taking prominent part in the program are: Rev. E. T. Capel of Montreal, Que., General Secretary of the S.S. Union of the Province of Quebec; Rev. J. C. Robertson, B. A., B. D.; Rev. F. L. Farrell, B. A.; Rev. P. K. Dayfoot, B. A., well known workers in the field work of our Ontario Sunday school denominational efforts, and many other local leaders.

In addition to home talent the program contains: Rev. A. H. McKinney, D. D., of New York, assistant to Rev. A. F. Schaffner, D. D., of international and world fame; Mrs. Mary Foster Bryner of Chicago, Ill., one of the staff of the International Sunday School Association, and Mr. Alfred Day, Syracuse, N. Y., who was General Secretary of the Ontario S. S. Association for thirteen years.

The music leader will be Mr. J. Ritchie Bell, Superintendent of the Montreal Sallors' Institute.

A special souvenir program and music booklet of 32 pages is being prepared. The demand for space and entertainment promises to tax the capacity of Brockville, and in, therefore, being controlled by issuing credentials to delegates, direct from the office of the Ontario Sunday School Association, Confederation Life Building, Toronto. These credentials will be issued in order of application on the principal of "first come, first served."

Mr. T. F. Harrison, Kingston, is President; Mr. Wm. Hamilton, Toronto, is Chairman of the Executive Committee; Mr. H. K. Irwin, E. C. Toronto, Treasurer. The General Secretary is Rev. E. W. Halpeny, B.D.

Western Notes

Winnipeg, Man., Oct. 3rd, 1911.

Electric cost, the atmosphere is charged with the matter that has been in the general estimation of all other news and partial stoppage of business for some weeks. It would be an extravagant statement to say that everybody is satisfied with the result of the election, but it is not beyond the truth to say that men of both parties are generally better satisfied with the fact that the result leaves no room for doubt and that certainty rather than questioning, is the only thing in order. Business men know the hangover their affairs will resume its wanted flow.

Opinions will differ as to whether the United States will have more or less interest in Canada as a result of the election. Certainly it cannot be true that all interest will cease because there is too many people from the United States in the West and too many coming in, for that to be the case. The West buys heavily from the States, too; and it is not highly probable that this buying will decrease because of the change in government.

The strongest feature of the West, from a United States point of view, under the conditions, is the desirability of locating factories here for making goods for the Western Canadian market. This is likely to prove even more attractive to manufacturers from the States than before and this interest will fit in nicely with the plans of Winnipeg for becoming a great industrial centre where all manner of goods shall be made for the western market. Within the next few weeks, Winnipeg will put in operation her four-million-dollar power plant, and will be strong in the field of furnishing cheap power and light for Winnipeg consumers. This city is easily the best labor centre in Western Canada, and has unsurpassed location and railroad facilities for gathering and distributing goods of all kinds.

Interest in Winnipeg is clearly marked by the fact that the Industrial Bureau of this city is receiving an average of seventy-five inquiries a day from different parts of the world—but chiefly from the United States and Great Britain—asking for information about Winnipeg as a city for location of new business enterprises, and about Western Canada as a field of trade development. The Bureau is able to quote facts and figures which show that there is no better field in the world for this sort of expansion and growth and very few that are anything like as good. Inquiry so extensive as this and answers so accurate and convincing must have great effect upon the growth of Winnipeg during the next few months.

Among the facts cited by the Industrial Bureau, are those relation to growth of the banking business in the West. This is set forth clearly in the following figures:

Winnipeg is taking a sharp interest in conventions from different parts of the world, and has been engaged for a year or more in quiet but effective work to secure as many of these gatherings as possible. The work has been attended with considerable success, the latest instance being the booking of the great Odd Fellows convention 1912. This gathering will be attended by 40,000 or 50,000 people and will be one of the biggest and most effective pieces of advertising for Winnipeg that has ever been accomplished. The convention will meet here next September, in the height of the harvest season and will do much to spread the fame of this city and country abroad.

The big convention will tax the capacity of Winnipeg for taking care of visitors. Fortunately, the city and its people have had much experience in this line and a few cities of the size of Winnipeg—175,000 people—are as well prepared to minister to the comfort of people in large numbers. There are sixty-five hotels in Winnipeg, and at least one more big one will be built and in service by next September. This is the new Fort Garry Hotel, now under construction by the Grand Trunk Pacific railroad. This hotel will be twelve stories high, will have 400 rooms, and will cost \$1,300,000.

The City Planning Association of Winnipeg is busy with plans for improving the city and for heading off all manner of errors into which a community may fall. Along this line of endeavor, delegates were sent to the Municipal Congress at Chicago last week. This delegation was made up of Controller Waugh, Street Commissioner Tallman, City Clerk Brown, and City Assessor Harris. The party will go as far south as Atlanta, Georgia, and will visit a number of cities en route, for studying ways, means and methods.
