Walpole Fair at Jarvis

Good Crowd and Good Sport Wednesday

The annual Walpole Fair held Wednesday was the most successful for some years. Last year the weather man appeared to have a grudge on Jarvis Fair day, and a result, rain drops fell plentifully. In fact it was feared that the same kind of weather would greet the fair this year, as rain fell in torrents all Tuesday afternoon and during the night but Wednesday with the exception of a stiff wind, the elements were of the right kind for such an occasion, and the crowds turned out. The show was a success from an educational and interest point of view, and the numerous competitions were keenly contested.

The horse ring as in previous years was characterized by the same excellent quality that has made it fair famous, and the judges made many twists and turns to arrive at conclusions. We might also state that the display of cattle, sheep and pigs were fine and many excellent specimens of Canadian breeds were shown, which attracted considerable attention. The feathered tribe while not numerous were fine birds and those which won prizes would do well to exhibit in other and larger shows.

The vegetable and fruit display although small, was exceedingly good. The art and fancy work portion of the show evoked numerous comments. The ladies must have worked assiduously to produce such excellent results. Not only was there quality but quantity and the judges experienced much difficulty in selecting the prize winners.

The dairy department was another feature, and the excellence of the exhibits evoked great credit on the part of the exhibitors. And taking the line of exhibits all round, it was a credit to those who had completed for the valuable prizes given by the committee.

The 48th Highlanders Band of Toronto and the Villa Nova band were great drawing cards and their program was one that made exacting demands upon the finest qualities in technique and tone of a command band, but the players met those demands with unquestioned success. They were very liberal in their selection and won the admiration of all.

The three well-contested races furnished much interest to the large crowd in attendance.
