#### Deanery of Haldimand

The Annual Conventions of the Sunday Schools and Woman's Auxiliary to Missions in the Deanery were held in the School room of St. Paul's Church on Monday and Tuesday of last week.

On Monday the representatives of the Sunday Schools were in Conference, delegates from the following parishes being in attendance, Hagersville, Caledonia, York, Cayuga, Dunnville, Port Maitland and S. Cayuga, Nanticoke and Jarvis. Addresses were given by the Bishop of Athabasca, the Rev. Canon Sutherland on "The Teachers Preparation," and Rev. A. G. Emmet, on "Definite teaching." The addresses were all very suggestive and helpful, and were much enjoyed. Miss Bull, Hamilton, had kindly prepared a thoughtful paper on "Primary Work," and this was read in her absence by Rural Dean Godden. The F. C. Walling, Cayuga, was appointed Secretary of the Deanery.

In the evening A. C. Noble, of Hamilton gave a stirring and deeply impressive address, after briefly touching on "The Sunday School and Missions" he devoted his time making an appeal for more Missionary interest and support as a messenger from the Hamilton Committee of the Laymen's Missionary Movement. After this the Bishop of Athabasca, who has been twenty-six years a Missionary in the north-west, gave a most interesting description of his work, and of the Indian and Eskimo in the Mackenzie River District.

On Tuesday it was the turn of the Woman's Auxiliary to discuss the Missionary work of the Society. Mrs. Thos. Hobson of the Diocesan Board, Hamilton, was present and gave invaluable assistance in the discussion. In the afternoon Miss Wade who has been for the past seven years one of our Missionaries

in China, gave an interesting and telling address on her work, and showed many curios. The Bishop of Athabasca spoke on the Indian Schools of his Diocese. The officers elected for Deanery Organization are Mrs. Bell, Jarvis, President; Mrs. Bennett, York, Secretary-Treasurer. The gathering came to an end at 4.30 p. m. after hearty votes of thanks had been passed, with singing a hymn and the Benediction.

#### Men's Missionary Convention

Hamilton, Nov. 2nd, 9th and 10th. For a month past the Hamilton Laymen's Missionary Committee has been in co-operation with the Laymen's Missionary Association of Canada laying plans for a great convention of men to be held in this city the second week in November, the 9th, 9th and 10th. Eleven of these conventions are being held throughout the Dominion. Hamilton district comprises Norfolk, Brant, Waterloo, Wellington, Grey, Dufferin, Peel, Halton, Wentworth, Haldimand, Welland, Lincoln, York, Simcoe, Ontario, Durham, Victoria, Peterboro, Northumberland, Haliburton, Muskoka District, Parry Sound District and Algoma District. Already letters and cards asking for lists of possible delegates have been sent out to some four hundred Presbyterian, four hundred Anglican, four hundred Methodist, two hundred Baptist and twenty five Congregational clergymen. Geo. C. Copley is chairman of the Hamilton Committee that is responsible for the success of this gigantic undertaking. It is not settled as yet where the convention will be held in this city, but it brings home to people the great necessity of a great convention-building, as it is expected five thousand people will want to hear Sir Andrew Fraser and some of the other prominent speakers whose names will mention later. Sir Andrew Fraser's father, Rev. A. J. Fraser, D.D., was an eminent minister of the Scottish Presbyterian Church, while his mother was the daughter of another clergyman of the same denomination, Rev. J. Shaw. Such being his parentage, it is easy enough to understand his taking an active and intelligent interest in church work. He was educated at Edinburgh Academy and Edinburgh University, obtaining at the latter the degree of M. A. in course and that of L. D. honorarily. In his 23rd year in 1871, he entered the Indian Service, and remained actively engaged therein until 1908, when he returned to Scotland, taking up his residence at Auchincleish, in Perthshire.

His activities in the Indian service covered a wide sphere. He was a member of the Historical Hemp Drugs Commission, which investigated the grave evils resulting from the general use of the drug, and whose report resulted in the enactment of drastic remedial laws of the greatest importance. For two years he was land revenue officer, an appointment which brought him directly in touch with all the local governing bodies of the country, and also with those holding Government concessions. The Government revenues increased materially during his administration, and incidentally many injustices and petty hardships imposed on poorer classes of natives disappeared.

In recognition of these services he was created C. S. I. For some time he held the important office of president of the police commission, using his influence to keep down the illicit sale and use of opium and other harmful drugs, and making a determined effort to put a stop to child murder and kindred heathenish practices, which in a few remote places had contrived to survive in spite of the law. From 1903 till 1908 he had the honor of holding one of the most dignified and influential appointments under the Government of India, that of Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal, and the year he received his commission to this office, he was created K. C. S. I. Sir Andrew Fraser is the man that a fanatic in India tried to assassinate. One of the great Indian princes threw himself between the assassin's pistol and Sir Andrew. Fortunately the gun missed and the trigger the third time, one of the workers in connection with the Y.M.C.A. in India grabbed the fanatic and was able to wrest the pistol from his grasp. Sir Andrew has a son who was a missionary in South Africa and took the sleeping sickness, and was ordered to discontinue his work, but would not give it up, so was sent to Ceylon, where he is actively engaged at the present time.

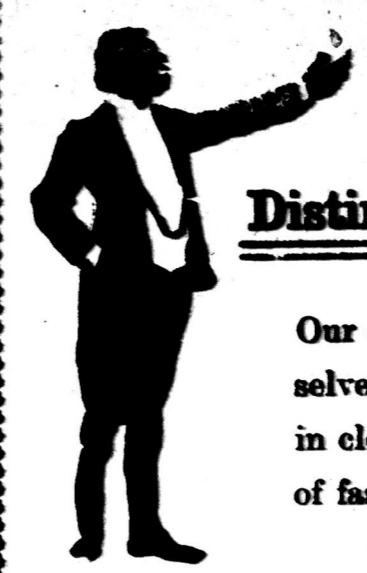

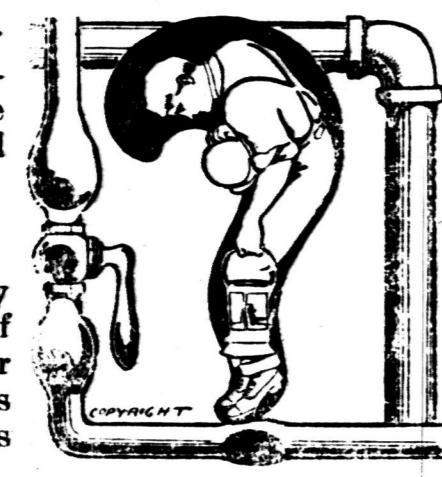
