Death of James McBride

James McBride was born the 15th day of November, 1828, near the city of Belfast, Ireland. When he was six months old he, with his parents, brothers and sister, left Belfast for Canada. After a long, tedious voyage they landed at Quebec and ultimately made their way to what is now called Norfolk county. His parents settled on a farm about two and one-half miles west of Port Dover. Here they lived a few years when they moved to Doans Hollow, where Mr. McBride lived until he married Isabella Austin, Sept. 29th, 1853. A year later he and his wife settled on the farm at Marburg where he died. Tuesday morning Oct. 15th 1911. On the following Thursday the remains were interred in the Port Dover Cemetery. The Pallbearers were his five sons and his eldest grandson. An immense number of relatives and friends attended the funeral. In addition to his widow he is survived by six sons, one son Samuel in the West and was not able to return in time for the funeral. Six daughters, forty-six grandchildren and sixteen great grandchildren. He was a good father and a good citizen. When our time comes to pass into the Great Beyond may we all have as many friends as the late James McBride possessed.

Death of Mrs. E. Rodgers

The news was received here on Monday of the death of Mary J. Bragg, beloved wife of Robert Rodgers, which sad event occurred at her late residence, 48 East avenue south, Hamilton, on Sunday, Oct. 15th, 1911. To some death comes with awful suddenness while to others the lingering hand is manifest. It was the latter with Mrs. Rodgers as for many years she has been in a declining state of health and death came as a happy release to her. Some three years ago she underwent two most critical operations for that much dreaded affliction cancer at the General Hospital, Hamilton, and although she got partial relief, it was quite evident that she would never enjoy robust health. She was always up and around until three weeks previous to her demise when she was obliged to take to her bed and since that time those who so kindly ministered unto her observed that death was hovering nigh. Her's was a most beautiful and consecrated life, and in her presence a most calm inspiration and benediction was felt by those who had the pleasure of her acquaintance. Mrs. Rodgers' will was in keeping with that of her husband, hence all her sufferings were borne with perfect resignation and her every day life was lived for the Master. Thus she lived that life until Sunday evening when at ten o'clock she answered to the roll call and received her reward of "Well done, good and faithful servant." Mrs. Rodgers was born in Bowmanville in the year 1846. She had spent the greater part of her life with her parents moved to Jarvis and lived on the farm at present occupied by Henry Johnston. In 1886 she was united in marriage to Robert Rodgers and since that time has made her home in Hamilton. She was a devoted member of the Methodist church. Besides her bereft husband she leaves her aged mother, Mrs. Harriet Bragg, who resided with her and a host of relatives and friends who have the sympathy of all, especially the husband and dear old mother. The funeral took place on Tuesday, the interment taking place at Bowmanville.

Obituary

There passed to her eternal reward on Wednesday, Oct. 11, 1911, at the family residence in Walpole, Mrs. W. Peacock at the ripe age of 85 years and 6 months. Her maiden name was Mary Ann Hamming and she was born in Devonshire, Eng., May 11th, 1826. While young she emigrated to Canada with her father, and after a long voyage in which the vessel was given up for lost, they reached Hamilton in 1837. After assisting in the re-belling of '37 he moved to Amherst and was then sent to the Old Homing homestead where the subject of this notice lived till she was married May 11th, 1850 to her now bereft partner when they moved to the present Parsons' homestead. They lived an industrious and happy life here up to the time of her death. Being of a retiring disposition Mrs. Parsons' life was lived for her home and as a result both her home and her sons, of whom there were six, three of whom are now living, were brought to positions of usefulness and honor. She was a life-long Christian, a student of Holy Word, which was her joy to the last. The community loses a highly esteemed citizen, faithful in all good works and one greatly missed. Of a family of one sister, Mrs. Snively of Michigan, and of five brothers, William Henning of Woodhouse, James of Michigan, Thomas of Dakota, John of Pelee Island and Dr. Nathaniel of Smithville, all have lived to a good old age. They celebrated their golden wedding in 1899. Rev. Coons being present and their sixtieth jubilee 1910, Rev. Harnwell being pastor at that time. Since March of the present year Mrs. Parsons has gradually been failing until Wednesday, Oct. 11th, full of honor and of years she passed into the Home above. A large gathering convened at the family residence at 2 p.m. Friday, Oct. 13, where a short service was held, after which interment took place in the family plot in the Methodist cemetery. A short memorial service was conducted by Revs. H. J. Harnwell and D. M. Buchanan in the Methodist church. A beautiful dunt was sung by the Misses Parkinson. The floral tributes were beautiful indeed, emblems of love and fidelity to the departed one. Besides her surviving husband she is mourned by three sons, W. E. of Lake View, Mich., John J. Beave of Walpole, and Louis N. of Windsor, and five brothers and one sister, besides a number of grandchildren all of which have the sympathy of the entire community.

H. Parsons and Kathleen of Windsor; Mrs. C. F. Parsons and Mrs. Eubank of Hagersville; J. J. Coons of Grimsby; Mr. and Mrs. John Austin of Hagersville.
