Forestry Notes

WOOD USING INDUSTRIES.

The Forestry Branch of the Department of the Interior is conducting an exhaustive statistical study of the industries in Ontario which in any way use wood in the manufacture of their products. This report will cover practically every manufacturer in Ontario, for besides those using wood directly, as in the manufacture of vehicles, cars, boats, automobiles, furniture and interior finish it is also expected that reports will be secured from every industry consuming wood for boxes and shipping crates. Information forms including a classified list of co-operating firms, a technical discussion of the various woods used, as well as statistics on the consumption and cost of each species. All individual information will be held strictly confidential by the Department. Such a work will be of benefit to every producer and consumer of wood in the province. To the mill-owner, it will show the purpose for which certain species are used, the quality of wood required and the prices paid. The manufacturer can ascertain what is the relative importance of his class of industry; and the total consumption and value of wood used in manufacture. Every manufacturer reporting will receive a copy of the bulletin when published. All those receiving schedules are asked to co-operate by reporting fully and promptly.

WOODLOT INSPECTION BY GOVERNMENT.

Increasing difficulty is being found in obtaining an adequate supply of hardwood lumber for the industries of Canada. The hardwood tracts of the eastern provinces for a long time have not been able to meet the demand, and in 1910, 60% of the hardwood used in Canada was imported from the United States. The United States, although with a much larger supply of hardwood on hand is also seeing the annual growth and that the virgin supply is being rapidly reduced. By practical demonstration it has been proven, that waste land if planted in young hardwoods will prove a profitable investment at the end of 25 years or more, and will improve the productiveness of the surrounding farm land. In the eastern provinces, large tracts of such land, covered at present with a unprofitable tree growth, which through being sandy, rocky or lying low, cannot be treated as agricultural lands. The Forestry Branch of the Department of the Interior is taking a special interest in the woodlots of Ontario, in an effort to make otherwise useless land supply hardwood lumber to the eager market with profitable returns to the wood lot owner. Parties interested in this matter should correspond with the department at Ottawa, which is already giving practical assistance on important tracts. Foresters will be supplied with timber land to look over tracts of timber, advise as to what species to encourage or plant according to the locality and general conditions, and suggest a general working plan. Such scientific knowledge, the result of former investigations, will be of a great benefit to private owners and should be sought after at once.

CANADA'S LOSS ON PULPWOOD—1910

The exportation of pulpwood in a raw form from the Canada into the United States is increasing yearly, and by just so much as this is so does Canada lose the benefits to be derived from manufacture and the increased value of raw products. The Forestry Branch of the Department of the Interior has compiled statistics showing that over a million and a half cords of pulpwood were cut in Canada during 1910, worth nearly \$9,800,000. Over 80% of this amount was sent out of Canada without further labor being expended on it. The United States manufacturers it into pulp and paper. From United States Forest Products Bulletin it is seen that approximately two-thirds of the pulpwood imported by that country is manufactured into mechanical pulp, and three-fifths into sulphite pulp, and that a cord of wood produces 1 ton of mechanical pulp or 1 ton of chemical pulp. This means that of the nine hundred and forty three thousand cords Canadian pulpwood sent into United States in 1910, 377,000 tons of mechanical pulp and 283,000 tons of chemical pulp were made. The value of this pulp, for which Canada received \$6,210,000 as pulpwood, was over thirteen and a half million dollars at the average prices paid in 1910 by United States importers of pulpwood. Thus Canada did not get one half the amount she would have received if all pulpwood was converted into pulp on Canadian soil. As the United States does not export 2% of what it imports, a certain and steady market would be found for all the wood pulp of Canadian production.
