**Rev. D. M. Buchanan's Call to Rouleau**

At a largely attended meeting of the congregation of Knox Church on Monday afternoon, called for the purpose of dealing with the call from Rouleau in the Regina Presbytery to their pastor, Rev. D. M. Buchanan, B.A., it was unanimously agreed to oppose his removal from this congregation for the following reason:

(1) Because of the successful and promising condition of the work in his present charge.

(2) Because Mr. Buchanan's seven years' pastorate among us has been most harmonious and faithful.

(3) Because the future of the congregation will, in our judgment, be much more successful under his most acceptable and experienced care than under the care of a successor.

(4) Because that not only in the church and in the homes of the congregation but also in the community at large, Mr. Buchanan has filled and is filling such a large place that it would be indubitably to disturb present relations.

The Session of the church also met on the same day and unanimously passed the following resolution: "The Session of Knox Church, Jarvis, learned with much surprise and pain of the application for the translation of their pastor to the Presbytery of Regina and sincerely hope that the Hamilton Presbytery may see its way clear to refuse the application.

The Session's regard for Mr. Buchanan has increased with the years. Even in his teaching, conscientiousness in duty large in outlook, generous in spirit and most considerate and courteous in manner he has in all his intercourse with the members of this session left the impression of a true Christian gentleman. The Session conscientiously believes that it would be decidedly in the interests of the cause of Christ in this congregation and neighborhood that the present successful and happy pastoral relationship be continued and would to this end pray the action of the Presbytery."

Messrs. Wm. Falls and Robert Miller were appointed to represent the congregation at the meeting of the Presbytery at Hamilton on Tuesday to present these resolutions to the Presbytery and to oppose Mr. Buchanan's removal from the congregation of Jarvis. The Walpole congregation also held their meeting Monday and were unanimous in their wish to retain Mr. Buchanan's services. Henry Falls was appointed to represent them at the Presbytery meeting.

**MR. BUCHANAN LEAVING**

At the meeting of Presbytery yesterday in Hamilton a call from Glenboro, Man., and one from Rouleau, Sask., to Rev. D. M. Buchanan were duly considered. The representatives from Jarvis and Walpole were heard and they all pleaded for the continuance of the present harmonious pastoral relationship. Many of the members of Presbytery spoke and whilst regretting the removal of Mr. Buchanan from this Presbytery in which he had rendered such efficient service, yet felt that the West needed such men as Mr. Buchanan, and after due consideration it was moved by Rev. W. S. Fisher, seconded by Mr. Thomas Hannah, seconded by Mr. Buchanan, that the transfer of Mr. Buchanan to Rouleau, of the Presbytery of Regina be granted. Mr. Buchanan expressed regret at leaving the congregation of Jarvis and Walpole that had been so kind and considerate to him, but he felt that the call to Rouleau was so important, opening up to him so great a sphere of usefulness, that his path of duty lay in accepting the call there. Mr. Buchanan and family will leave for the West in about two weeks.
