CENSUS MAKES THE POPULATION 7,100,000

Gain of Nearly Two Millions-Saskatchewan Largest Increase.

Ottawa despatch: The official census figures of the Dominion were handed cut to-night by Hon. Martin Burrell, Minister of Agriculture. They show that the population is about 7,100,000, an increase of nearly 2,000,000 in ten years. The figures will be slightly increased when the full returns have been received. Some of the returns are not complete. There are four electoral districts which have not yet made full returns, viz., Cumberland in Nova Scotia, Regina and Battleford in Saskatchewan, and Yale-Cariboo in British Columbia,

which are estimated to give a population of 70,000. The population of the cities and towns reported may be changed slightly on ravision, but it is thought it may be accepted as correct.

Five Cases of Rabies Under Treatment in Toronto.

Toronto despatch: Rabies has made its appearance in Toronto and five cases are now under trestment by the Provincial Health officers. One dog, which upon examination was found to have suffered from rabies, is responsible for four of the cases. \$2,000,000 SURVEY

Boundary Between Northern Canada and U.S.

Vancouver, B. C., Oct. 22.-J. D. Craig. Vancouver, B. C., Oct. 22.—I. D. Craig, Chief of the Canadian Boundary Survey, here from Alaska to-day, says the past few months have been devoted to running a line along the 141st meridian from Mt. St. Elias, to the Arctic Ocean. The survey started this year at the Arctic Circle and completed the line to within thirty miles of the Arctic Ocean. The work consists of cutting paths twenty feet wide through the dense timber, putting up bronze monuments at average distances of three miles apart, and mapping the country. The expedition consisted of 90 men and 200 horses. Canadian surveyors composed about half of the joint party. joint party.

The survey of the boundary between

The survey of the boundary between the northern possessions of the United States and Canada, is costing the two Governments jointly about \$2,000,000. The work has been going on for the past fourteen years, but will be completed probably next year. Work on the list meridian has been under way for the past five years. With the extension of the line from Davidson's Mountains, where it was left this year, to the Arctic Ocean, the entire survey will have been completed. The Davidson Mountains are about \$,000 feet high and are very rugged and inaccessible.
