by that of the bark bettles. Not only have these insects killed practically all the tamarack, but they are now at work destroying the scattered patches of mature spuce. When the beetles have finished their work and killed the trees, a strong wind overthrows these. Finally lightning sets fire to the tangle of debris resulting, and the fire, thus started, may run over mile after mile of the country.
