"Furniture is quite unknown in a common Eskimo home," writes the wife of the Danish governor of Greenland, Anna Bistrup, in an article on "Eskimo Wemen in Greenland" in the September "Century."

The houses of the Eskimos are all built of stone and turf, with the wind-ows opening toward the sun, the one entrance always being on the side that is least exposed to the wind. Along the back wall runs a platform, a pallet of bosards, raised eighteen inchets above the floor. It is from six to eight feet deep and through its whole length is divided into rooms or spaces of eight or ten feet. Each room is separated from the neighboring room by a partition of board or skin. An open passage runs the whole length of the house along the pallet rooms and serves for the traffic houses of the Eskimos are all pallet rooms and serves for the traffic of all the inmates; but each pallet room claims for its own the bit of passageway

claims for its own the bit of passageway adjoining.
"Each pallet room is occupied by one family, and there they stay night and day. The best pallet room is the innermost, and is always occupied by the owner of the house, or the oldest, if the house has more than one owner."




