J. W. Chapman of Nelles Corners
was calling in the village yesterday.

At the evening service in St.
Paul's church last Sunday Arch-
deacon Belt spoke on the responsi-
bilities which rest upon the voters
in an election, and admonished all
to vote conscientiously in the ap-
proaching contest. He said that it
was not the part of the church to
take sides, or become the engine of
a party. But, preserving the dig-
nity of a voice which speaks for
Eternity and not for time, it is here
to lay down the principles which
should guide the people. In the
first place he pointed out that the
unity of the country is to be con-
sidered. Each legislator legislates
for the whole Dominion, not for
his own constituency only, that
each elector holds his fran-
chise as a sacred trust to be exer-
cised for the general good. We
are selecting a legislator not merely
for Haldimand but for Canada.
Votes are not merchandise to be
bought and sold. Bribery is a sin
against God because it lowers the
name of personal responsibility.
The man who has rectitude and
self-respect will not be bribed; it
is only the low minded and unprin-
ciple who will sell themselves.
An election may be a religious act
as far as each man does his part as
a duty and solemn responsibility.

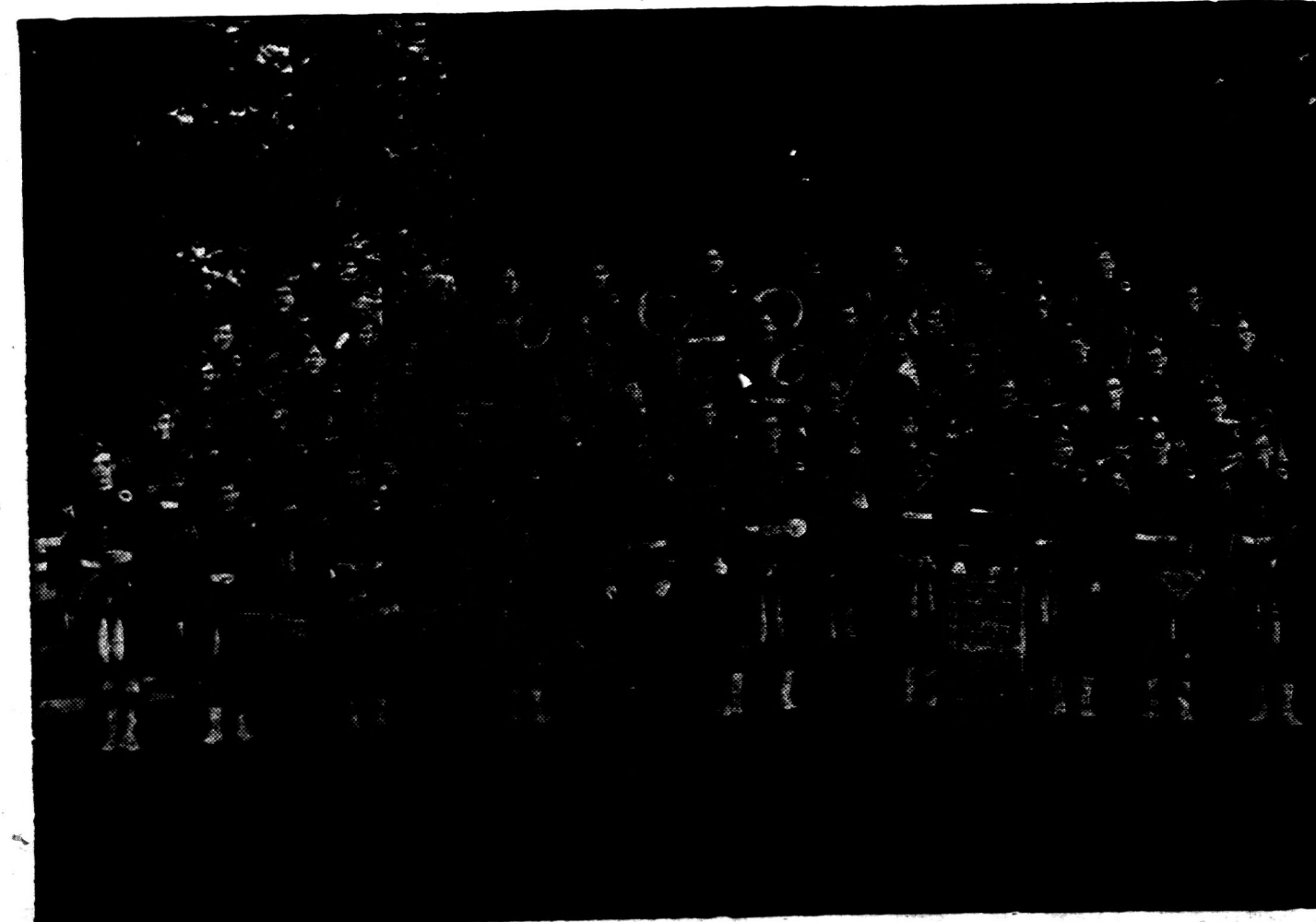
