Value of the Letter "H"

Then it showed itself to be impossible. It seems to be in nearly every word I try to write, and just for the fun of the thing I looked into the matter a little and was surprised to find how near omnipresent that letter is in our language particularly in expressing ideas of every importance and sentiment.

To begin with, without the "H" we are at once bereft of home and heaven, not to mention helen. We are left without a head, a hand, or a heart. There can be no health without it. While we are thus left without hope we are relieved of heat and can never get hot. Its absence assures us an earth without ending. We would all be baldheaded, for without it hair cannot begin. Similarly, we are deprived of habits and habitations. We would have neither heirs nor heiresses, hens nor horses, hounds nor hash.

The world would be dreary without "ha ha's" or "ho, ho's," but we might cheer up because hanging would be at an end. Our stars would make no more hits and there would be no more hapsins. Hamlet would be forgotten. Things would be real, however, for there would be no hollow mockeries. We could neither have nor hold a half or a whole. There would be no waste, because there would be no harts. We would lose that good old phrase, "hale and hearty." No one would be handsome.

There would be no more halcyon days full of harmony of the harp. Hallelujahs would never be heard. We wouldn't be able to hear. No harbingers of spring would come. There would be no halters for humbags. Haughty young women in hammocks would be no longer be headless of the hay fever sufferers. The height of heels would cease to be a problem. There would be no household help. The days of the hunt would be over as well as those of the hen pen. He, her, him and his would cease to play a leading part in the young woman's conversation. There would be no passing hearses to haunt us.

But, after all, we might get along, for we would still be born, live and eat, sleep and sing, play and work, get married, enjoy life, die and be buried, all without the help of the letter "H."

School Books and Faulty Eyesight

Having spent two years and a half in investigating the causes of increasing eye strain and nearsightedness among children in the public schools, the Children's Welfare Committee of the Association of Women's Principals of the Public Schools met recently with representatives of the publishers of schoolbooks and made an extensive report of the discoveries made.

Katherine Blake, chairman of the committee, said that her investigations had convinced her that schoolbooks should not be bound, but should be furnished to school children in pamphlet form. She said pamphlets were more sanitary than bound books, and when a child had completed the use of a set of them they could be destroyed.

The subject of illustrations in schoolbooks was studied by the committee, with the assistance of the heads of the departments of psychology in leading universities. Summarized, the result of the study of the illustration problem was that the eyes of the children are subjected to unnecessary strain by the presence of illustrations in the middle of pages in school books. The committee recommended that the illustrations occupy a full page or that they be placed either at the top or at the bottom, or that they be run in a panel down the page. Use of any of these devices, the committee said, would decrease the strain to which the eyes are subjected by the presence of an illustration in the middle of the page. Outline illustrations were recommended in preference to half-tones. Length of the line of reading matter in a schoolbook was the subject of a report. It was found that in some schoolbooks the eye has to travel five inches before it reaches the end of the line. The committee decided that the eyes would be benefited if the length of the line was reduced to three inches. With that as the maximum and with 2 1/2 inches as the minimum, the committee said the best results would be obtained. The committee also recommended that the space between the lines be at least three millimeters. The use of calendered or coated paper was condemned because of the glare. Type in the schoolbooks was also studied. It was found that in Germany the percentage of nearsightedness is greater than it is in England or in the United States, and that the percentage in this country could be reduced by the use of clearer type.

Dark schoolrooms were condemned and the committee recommended that schoolbooks be printed in such fashion that they may be read even in rooms in which the lighting facilities are not of the best.
