Waterford Post Office Robbed

Brantford, Sept. 23.—The Waterford post office was broken into early this morning, the safe dynamited and over \$3,000 in cash stolen. Postmaster Alex. Rock first discovered the robbery when he came down to the office at 7 o'clock this morning and the dynamiters had several hours in which to make good their escape.

It is believed the robbery was effected shortly after midnight by three strangers who were seen about town during the day. A description of the men has been secured and the police throughout the country have been wired.

The Post Office Inspector of London has been summoned to investigate the affair by Postmaster Rock. Entrance to the post office was effected by means of a sledge hammer applied to the rear window. Dynamite was used on the safe and it was blown to pieces.

The large amount of money had been registered on Friday by the Northern Crown Bank, of Scotland, for delivery at headquarters in Toronto and was contained in one sealed package. In addition \$8 in cash from the till and \$145 in stamps were secured. It is not believed the robbers know of the sealed cash package in the office, although they had been at Scotland that afternoon.

The robbery has caused the greatest excitement in the community but it is believed the marauders made good their escape. The dynamiting was done by trained hands, a drill having been used.

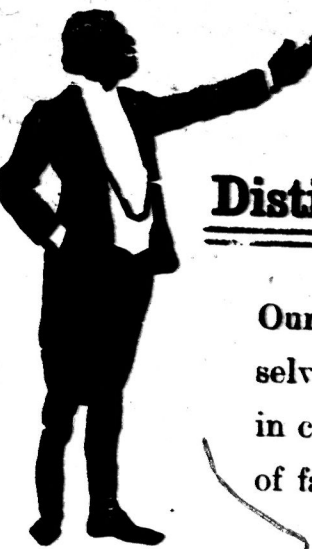

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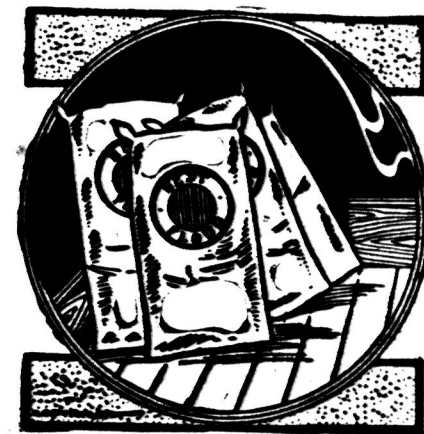
