Note and Comment

Getting rich quickly is not always difficult, but it is always dangerous.

We bury old hopes only that out of their graves new ones may rise.

The control of infectious diseases has reached a point where it is possible to say that the average length of life has been increased by about 12 years.

Toronto boot and shoe dealers will raise the price of rubbers about 25 cents higher and of boots and shoes from 30c to \$1 a pair. Will somebody please put the price on record now so that we shall know when prices increase and when they will reduce?

The man Marconi who invented or discovered and made wireless telegraphy practicable, is a supreme benefactor of humanity, and Canada, whose government was the first to adopt wireless telegraphy and give impulse to its universal adoption can take a good deal of credit to herself.

The Ontario Government is to be congratulated on making it illegal for hotel-keepers to cash cheques for workmen. Grocers and butchers will be found ready to cash these cheques, and would not greatly object even if they had to be roused from their beds to do so.

Without wireless telegraphy, we might still be without word of the Titanic. No vessel would have been despatched to the scene to pick up the survivors. If the people in the life-boats had perished from swamping or exposure, the disappearance of the giant liner and her human cargo might have been as great a mystery as was the fate of the Atlantic in 1873.

There is an old superstition to the effect that a Mason has never been hanged, but when a Mason commits a crime in England the chances of escape are not improved because the judge happens to belong to the same brotherhood. A few days ago a man named Seddon was convicted of murder, and before being sentenced to death he made a Masonic sign to Mr. Justice Buckmill, who remarked that it was doubly painful for him to pass the death sentence on a brother Mason. He imposed it, nevertheless, and Seddon, who poisoned a woman, will pay the penalty on the scaffold.

Two or three men meet. An invitation to have a drink follows, and they line up before the bar. Therefore, with mutual consent, each pays for his own drink, or drinks, instead of each "standing treat" and thus equally dividing the expense. The solitary drinker is not molested. The prohibition of treating will not prevent a man from passing in the bar together or sitting down for a jamboree. All that is posed is that each man must bear his own expenses. In the majority of cases the expense end will work out very much the same as if there was no anti-treating law.

It would, perhaps, be better if statute labor all over this province were abolished and a tax equal to its computed value levied upon every municipality in the province. This large sum should be controlled by the government and returned to each municipality year by year to be used in the construction of permanent highways of an approved standard and subject to inspection by a specialist. If this amount were supplemented by a liberal grant from the province every year, there would soon be good roads in every part of Ontario and no one would be greatly worried by the cost of them.

The value of the prison farm is that it affords the inmates an opportunity to find useful employment amid healthy conditions.

Around About Us.

A pretty event took place at the home of J. G. Herron of Goshen on April 17, when their daughter Marybelle was married to A. H. Elliott of Delhi.

During the thunder storm Sunday evening the barn of Chas. Culver in the core of Woodhouse was completely destroyed by fire. The contents were saved.

Mrs. Annie Hayes, of Hartford was found dead in bed Tuesday by her son Mr. Thomas Hayes. Deceased was 72 years of age and had only been sick a day or two.

Mrs. Lloyd Roberts (nee Nellie Belmain) died at her home in Ottawa, recently. The Belmain family lived in Tillsonburg for a number of years before going to New York.

Wednesday Victor Garman of Tillsonburg was presented with a medal for bravery in trying to save the life of Wm. Melvin, who was drowned in the water work pond last summer.

Nicholas Tisdale, one of the pioneers of Middleton, died at his home in Courtland Thursday. The funeral took place Saturday to the Methodist church, Courtland for service and interment.

During the thunder storm Sunday the barn of J. Lovegrove, Dunnville, was struck by lightning and burned to the ground, together with a horse two cows, four pigs and a number of chickens.

The death occurred Friday at Tillsonburg of W. S. Ferguson, at the age of 77 years. For the past five years he has been in failing health but he contracted pneumonia which hastened his death.

At Hamerstone on Wednesday at the home of the bride's sister, Mrs. Alex. Purry, the marriage took place of Miss Alice Mann Noble to Mark John Fess of Selkirk. The ceremony was performed by Rev. G. W. Brooker.

Tuesday night about 35 couples gathered at the home of Robert Preston, Simcoe, to say farewell to Mr. and Mrs. Sharp who are moving to Norwich. At 12 o'clock before partaking of a lunch, a Morris chair finished in Russian leather was presented to Mr. Sharp.

Sunday lightning struck the barn on Wm. McDonald's farm on the town line between Townsend and Walpole and completely destroyed the building and contents, including 8 cows, 3 horses, 1 colt 9 pigs, implements, grain bags, buggies and demotors. The loss will amount to some \$3,000 full covered by insurance. Part of the contents of the barn belonged to Charles Cooper's, tenant, who had just moved.
