Many Things Which Are Hard to Explain.

The coming and going of the birds is more or less a mystery and a surprise. We go out in the morning and no thrush or fluch is to be hard; we go out ag-am and every tree and grove is musical; yet again, and all is silent. Who saw them come? Who saw them depart?
Yonder bluebird, with the earth tinge on his breast and the sky tinge on his back—did he come out of heaven on that bright March morning when he told us so softly and plaintively that, if we pieased, spring had come? Indeed, there is nothing in the return of the birds more curious and suggestive than in the first appearance, or rumors of the appearance, of this little bluecoat.

The bird at first seems a mere wandering voice in the air; one hears it call or

carci on some bright March morning; but is uncertain of its voice or its direc-tion, it falls like a drop of rain when no cloud is visible; one looks and listens,

nt to no purpose.
Not long after the bluebird comes the robin, sometimes in March, but in most of the Northern States April is the month of the robin. In large numbers they scour the fleids and groves. You hear their piping in the meadow, in the pasture, on the hillside. Walk in the woods and the dry leaves rustle with the whirr of their wilder. of their wings, the air is vocal with their ail. In excess of joy and vivac-run, leap, scream, chase each through the air, diving and sweep-

that free, fascinating, half-work half-pay pursuit-sugar making the robin is one's constant companion. When the day is sunny and the ground you meet him at all points and henr him at all hours. At sunset on the tops of the tall maples, with look heavenward, and in a spirit of utter abandon-ment, he carols his simple strain. And sitting thus amid the stark, silent trees, above the wet, cold earth, with the chill sweeter songster in the whole round

Another April bird, which makes her appearance sometimes earlier and sometimes later than the robin, and whose fondly cherish, is the Phoebebird, the pioneer of the fly-catchers. In the inland farming districts I used to no-tice her, on some bright morning about Esster-day, proclaiming her arrival with much variety of motion and attitude, from the peak of the barn or hay shed.

Another April comer, who arrives shortly after the robin redbreast, with he associates both at this segent and in the autumn, is the "golden-winged woodpecker," alias "highhole," alias "flicker," alias "yarup." He is an old faverite of my boyhood, and his note to me means very much. He announces his arrival by a long, loud call, repeated from the dry branch of some tree, or a etake in the fence-a thoroughly melodsous April sound.
The song sparrow, that universal fav-

orite and firstling of the spring, comes before April, and its simple strain gladdens all hearts.

May is the month of the swallows and the orioles. There are many other dis-tinguished arrivals, and indeed nineenths of the birds are here by the last week in May, yet the swallows and ori-

week in May, yet the swanows and ori-oles are the most conspicuous. With June the cup is full, our hearts are satisfied, there is no more to be de-sired. The perfection of the season, among other things has brought the perfection of the song and the plumage of the birds. The master artists are all here, and the expectations excited by the robin and the song sparrow are fairly justified. The thrushes have all come, and I sit down upon the first rock, with full of the pink azaleas, to listen. With me the cuckoo does not arrive till. June: and often the goldfinch, the king-hird, the scarlet tanager; delay their coming till then. In the meadows the bosoink is in all its glory; in the high pastures the field sparrow sings his breesy vesper hymn, and the woods are unfolding to the music of the thrushes.





A French chicken farmer claims that small quantity of wine increases the egg-producing capacity of hens to a considerable degree. He divided a flock of twelve hens sixteen months old into

two groups of six. Each group was fed with exactly the same amount of grain, bread, etc., but the bread given one group was soaked with wine. In the four months of the test the wine fed hens laid 148 eggs more than the other six.
