Hail At Toronto

Toronto, August 2.—Hail the size of large peas, accompanied by a torrent of rain, a whirl of wind, thunder, lightning and at one time almost darkness struck Richmond Hill yesterday afternoon at four o'clock, and continued for nearly an hour. The disturbance began at three o'clock with a drizzle of rain. The sky blackened and at four o'clock the hail began sifting down in a whirl of wind drifting like a snow storm. For three-quarters of an hour the hail continued.

Wrapped Bread

Boards of health are ever on the look-out for the causes of the scattered cases of typhoid fever that occur here and there. It is evident not due to water or milk contamination, the two most frequent sources of the disease, for these would give a series of infections. During the last year bread as a possible carrier of typhoid fever has been investigated rather rather startling results. The Journal of the American Medical Association calls particular attention in its issue of July 8 to cases of typhoid fever that have developed in public institutions that have been traced to attendants who were nursing typhoid fever patients and subsequently handled the bread of the institution. Bread is one of the foodstuffs that is still handled a little carelessly. It is obviously subject to pick up dangerous bacterial contamination. To be perfectly safe, loaves of bread that are to be sold should be wrapped carefully in waxed paper while still warm, and this should not be removed until ready for use in the household.

Advice To Swimmers

Mr. T. W. Sheffield, hon. member of the Royal Life Saving Society sent out the following: The many drowning fatalities recorded by the press during the summer season call for more care being taken by the average swimmer and beachgoers generally, and it is earnestly desired that the following don'ts for swimmers and pointers for non-swimmers be posted up in a conspicuous place at the bathing place or summer resort the reader sits to help to minimize any undue risk being taken by followers of the sport: Don't bathe shortly after dining; wait at least two hours. Don't sit in a boat or stand undressed after being in the water. Don't swim far after a hard day's work, or over-exertion after other forms of exercise. Don't bathe in unfrequented or secluded parts. Don't bathe alone if subject to giddiness or faintness. Don't dive into the water without first ascertaining the depth. Don't take fright if you fall into the water with your clothes on; remember clothes float, and assist you to float. Make for the shore, swimming far out to sea unattended by a boat or an expert swimmer. Don't take fright if you are with cramps; keep cool; turn on the back and endeavor to rub the place affected. If the leg is drawn up with pain, swim slowly with the arms only. All swimmers should practise this. Don't swim without some recognized signal to give your fellow swimmers, if subject to cramps, such as lifting one arm or shouting for help. Don't abuse this; turn on the water as soon as possible. Don't dive out of or try to get into a boat from the side; dive from the stern and get in from stern, but only then from boat with a broad beam. Don't swim near dams, waterfalls, or steeply growing. Don't swim along the shore. Don't swim with company if you have a weak heart, and only then after consulting a doctor. Don't swim against the stream if you come across weeds. Don't swim without protecting your ears if subject to ear trouble. Don't swim and pointers to beginners and non-swimmers are thus given. Don't go beyond the depth of your hips if you can't swim. Don't plunge or struggle when you find yourself in deep water. Don't throw the hands or arms out of the water. Don't grasp any person who approaches you; do what he tells you. Don't attempt to get into a boat coming to your rescue; catch hold of the stern until assisted to get in. Tread water by keeping the legs moving up and down, as in walking upstairs. Hold an oar or canoe paddle, plank or branch of an oar or paddle flat on the water will keep you if you don't struggle. Take in long breathes through the mouth and exhale slowly through the nostrils; this makes the body more buoyant and keeps you warm. If you follow these directions help yourself and others coming to your assistance. When canoeing, take a life belt if you are not an expert.

Your Enemies

You can't make a real success without making your enemies. You can't hold a strong position without strong opposition. You won't seem right to any if you don't seem wrong to many. Viewpoints aren't uniform. Standards of morals and ethics—means of livelihood—sources of happiness and prosperity—vary with individual habits of mind and life. Men aren't ants. Humans aren't born with standardized impulses and with standardized types of proficiency and intellect—untold variations of intelligence. There isn't a living soul with whom you entirely agree on every subject. All minds, like all thumbprints, are original and unique. Even if every issue and every situation in the same light of reason as a fellow creature. So how can you hope, even under the most favorable of auspices, to have everybody like you or like you? You must think for yourself—you must reason for your own intuitions—you must be guided by only your own personal observations and convictions. The greater your force of character, the more you'll force others to demonstrate their differing characteristics. My you're upright and just and sane and clean and capable, it isn't a matter with your own volition to gain infirmities and warped and erratic and mean and criminal and brutal men. You must take sides in society, and even among your chosen associates, you must stand prepared for constant disagreement. You must stub your advancing feet against jealousy and bigotry and rascality. And the more decidedly you progress, the more vehemently you'll conflict with those who dislike you. You can't attain without hundreds of others believing that you have interfered with their rights. A useful life can't be entirely peaceful and free. Every earnest man in every generation has paid the price of individuality. You can't dodge. The greater you are, the greater the penalty of your progress. The further you go, the wider you range, the more you increase the points of contact with which you must reckon, and these, you multiply your battles against misapprehension and slander and envy and malice. You can't avoid or evade your allotted destiny—you can only hold down your share of trouble by holding back. In every sphere men give and snare—even the peace of the ditch-digger who covets his job. So long as you aspire, others will conspire to long as you try, face in every place and at every stage. Go straight on to your goal. So long as your conscience isn't ashamed to acknowledge you as a friend, don't give a rap for your enemies.

The Traction Engine

The invention of farm machinery has had a profound effect on the welfare of mankind. The last great invention of that kind affecting the temperate zone now brought another, the traction engine or tractor with the disc plow, which is enabling the rapid development of the West. Could our friends the Masseys not make the gasoline or kerosene tractor workable in the smaller fields of Ontario? The machinery might be owned by syndicates of farmers or in the hands of the contractor who now does the threshing, it would add to his profits. The lighter tractor, if made workable in Ontario, would enable a better cultivation of the crop and it would aid in the destruction of the weeds. A case is cited from Minnesota of a tractor which broke last year 245 acres of sod and a half million of stubble, using two and a half gallons of kerosene an acre, costing eight and three quarters cents a gallon.

False Pretences is Charge

Getting money by false pretences is the charge that should be laid against half a dozen emigration agents and corporations of false bait. Which fraudulent advertisements they induce people to come out here in order that the dividends of transportation companies may be boosted. To these sharks a boom in emigration means money. To the unfortunate emigrant it means a life of misery and degradation, instead of a temporary break-up of happy homes, it means a permanent disunion of near and dear ones. It means misery to thousands who could otherwise have been comparatively contented and prosperous, and this wholesale robbery and fraud is a scandal and blot on Canada's fair name. Rigorous steps ought to be taken by the government to bring to book the persons, no matter what high positions they hold, who perpetrate these heartless frauds.

Animal Companions

The child deprived of pets misses much. To love a dog, cat, a bird, or any live thing has a humanizing influence on the character. The care of a pet teaches a child to be responsible for something. The love of the pet brings out the tender feelings of his heart, makes a child less inclined to cruelty, more thoughtful, of quicker sympathy. A pet gives him something to enjoy at home and so makes home life richer. It is one means of keeping him from undesirable companions. It helps to form habits of industry. In providing food and shelter for a living creature he is learning responsibility. While teaching a dog how to perform a trick, the child is enlarging his own intelligence and his patience. If he is learning to ride a horse, he is gaining in courage, and in self-reliance. A wide held of interest is opened to the child with a pet. In learning about one animal he learns about many. His love of pet fills his mind with useful and good thoughts and there is less room for the idle or vicious. He should have this happiness if it can be given him.

Forestry Convention at Victoria

Ottawa, Aug. 3.—The annual convention of the Canadian Forestry Association, for the first time since 1906, is to be held this year on the Pacific Coast, the place being Victoria and the dates, Sept. 4, 5 and 6. Mr. James Lawler, of Ottawa, Secretary of the Association, has just returned from the coast, where arrangements are now well under way for the meeting. In addition a number prominent men interested in forest conservation in the east, both lumbermen and others, have signified their intention of being present. The railways have granted specially low rates to delegates, and as the subjects discussed will be of importance to all parts of Canada, it is expected there will be a large attendance. A number of well known forest engineers and lumbermen from the United States will also attend.

Good Year for Weeds

It is proverbial that every year is favorable to the growth of weeds, but the present season seems a particularly happy one for the unwelcome vegetation on many Ontario farms. A single representative of this paper, who took a trip through York and Simcoe counties over the week end, was struck by the unusual rank development of the field pests he observed from a car window. One-eyed daisy, sow thistle and mustard looked to be enjoying unchecked prosperity in many fields, and in a number had almost succeeded in entirely choking out the sown crop. The intermittent periods of heat and moisture that have characterized the summer so far have proved advantageous alike to the grain and weeds. In weeds where the farmer was careless in testing his seed or where he misplaced trust in a dealer it appears to the observer to be a "life or death" struggle between the two classes of plants for which shall yield most to the reaper's swath. As weeds are generally the more persistent, the indifferent farmer stands fair to lose heavily in the present season.
