Sheffield, hon. member of the Royal Life Saving Society sent out the following: The many drowning fatalities recorded by the press during the summer season call for more care being taken by the average swimmer and beginners generally, and it is earnestly desired that the following don'ts for swimmers and pointers for non-swimmers be posted up in a conspicuous place at the bathing place or summer resort the reader aisits thus helping to minimize any untue risk being taken by followers of the sport: Don't balhe shortly after dining: wait at least two hours. Don't sit in a boat or stand undressed after being in the water. Don't swim far after a hard day's work, or over-exertion after other foims of excerse. Don't bathe in unfrequented or secluded parts. Don't bathe alone is subject to giddiness or faintness. Don't dive into the water without first ascertaining the depth. Don't take fright if cramps, such as lifting one arm or shout you warm. If you follow these directions hold down your share of trouble by holdbelt if you are not an expert.


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
