Investigations at the Harvard Medical School, under the auspices of the State Board of Health have resulted in such discoveries that the medical profession there is confident the time for final conquest of infantile paralysis is at hand. Shepard, a special investigator of the board who has given his entire time for four years to the study of the disease, and who is one of the authorities of the United States on it, has found that the scourge is caused by a virus instead of bacteria.
