Hicks' Forecasts—August

A regular storm period covers the 23 to 27th, central on the 24th. Moon in apogee on the 25th and full on the 27th. The center of a mercury period is on the 25th. Be on the watch for equinoctial storms in the south! Very low barometer will be of danger at this period, with best indications for general rains. An- other seismic period involves the 24th to 30th, centering on the 27th. The general disturbances at this time promise to be aggravated and prolonged into the reactionary storm period, central on the 29th, 30th and 31st. The moon passes over the celestial equator on the 29th, near its full. The autumnal equinox of the earth will also bear heavily on the period, the Jupiter, the Venus and the mercury periods adding their forces to the strong combination. The barometer should be carefully watched during the last ten days of August, especially in the Gulf regions, and all indications of West India storms should be promptly heeded. August promises to go out with storm and threatening weather generally, pass- ing eastwardly over the country. Change to much cooler, and possibly frost, north-ward will attend high barometer at close of the month. A seismic period, 24th to 30th, central 27th.

Broke Both Legs

What might have been a fatal accident happened in Caledonia on Friday last, when Thomas Kelly, clerk in the office of the Caledonia Milling Company, was struck by a runaway horse in front of his office. He was knocked down and both his legs were broken, one at the ankle and the other below the knee. The horse was owned by John Thorburn of Oneida township, and broke away at the G. T. R. station. It was running down Main street, and just as Mr. Kelly stepped out of his office to the sidewalk, the horse bolted right on him. At first the attend- ing physicians were afraid of internal injuries, but happily no further complications are looked for and the pa- tient is resting nicely, although suffering greatly. Mr. Kelly is a well known citi- zen and a member of the village council in Caledonia.
