### Trip to New York

(Intended for last week)

Through the enterprise and generosity of the Frost Wire Co., Mr. John Walker had a most enjoyable free trip last week to New York, Philadelphia and Washington as one of the winners in the sales contest the company put on this season. It is impossible in this short space to begin to describe the many wonderful and beautiful things he saw on the trip, but he has brought home views and booklets which he will be pleased to show his friends at any time.

The party of 36 were well looked after personally by Manager Frost and Sales Manager Sage and other representatives of the Company. One of the dealers was 82 years old and no one enjoyed the trip better than he did. Special cars and complete arrangements had been previously provided for and no expense was spared to give every man the best trip he had ever had. The beautiful summer-like weather increased the pleasure of the trip.

Only a mere outline of the trip can be given here. At Niagara Falls, N.Y., special cars took the party over to the beautiful Gorge Route and a visit was made to the fine plant of the Shredded Wheat Company from which over one million biscuits are shipped every day. After enjoying the evening at Shea's Theatre in Buffalo, the party left in their own special Pullmans for New York. A stop-over was made at Albany, where the state capital buildings were seen which cost \$35,000,000. At 4:30 the party arrived in the great city of New York, which has a population larger than the whole province of Ontario and includes almost every nationality.

Everything in New York is on a vast scale. The business section is crowded with skyscraper buildings and the capital are thronged with people and automobiles both night and day. Its famous Broadway (14 miles long) lit up at night with miles of electric lights and thousands of coloured electric signs on the tops of the many skyscraper buildings make it a veritable fairyland. Its three great methods of transportation consisting of elevated railways, surface lines and a wonderful underground system, which cost \$50,000,000, are constantly thronged with traffic. Trains of six and seven coaches rush along at intervals of only two or three minutes both day and night. New York contains more wealth than perhaps any other city in the world. Here is an illustration of the value of property, and a saloon property was pointed out on Lower Broadway the owner of which had refused \$2500 a sq. foot or equal to two and a half million dollars an acre. In Lower Broadway we visited the famous financial district and the New York Stock Exchange which to a large extent controls the stock markets of the whole world and membership is in constant demand at a price ranging from \$60,000 to \$95,000. Old Trinity Church with its tombstones dating back to the seventeenth century was also visited and John Wannamaker's famous departmental store, the largest in the world. A walk across Brooklyn bridge afforded an idea of the importance of New York as a shipping port. By means of sight-seeing cars, the homes of the richest men in the world on 5th Avenue were seen, including the Astors, Vanderbilts, etc., and they are conspicuous by the absence of any lawn or grass. A trip was made to the top of the Metropolitan Building over 44 stories high and 700 ft. from the ground from which a beautiful view was had, including the Woolworth Building which is 55 stories high and is the highest building in the world. One of the most interesting trips in New York was to the great Central Park Museum where many ancient relics were seen, including mummies who lived over 4000 years ago and also pillars, etc., taken from the palaces of the ancient Pharaohs, including the famous Cleopatra's Needle. Another most interesting visit was to Bronx Park which contains one of the greatest collections of living animals, plants and flowers of the world. The evening performance in the world famous Hippodrome which has a stage larger than four ordinary theatres was a gorgeous spectacle.

Another interesting evening was spent in a sight-seeing trip through the great Boverly or East side foreign district, with its crowded quarters and where most of the poor are housed. Leaving New York by the great Pennsylvania Railway station, electric trains conveyed us through the tunnels under the Hudson River to Jersey City from whence a fast two hours' run brought us to Philadelphia, the Quaker City founded in 1682 by Wm. Penn and later the home of Benj. Franklin. In this city the American Republic was born and the signing of the Declaration of Independence and a visit to Independence Hall, in which is stored the famous Liberty Bell, proved most interesting. Other interesting points visited were the U. S. Mint, The Curtis Publishing House, where the Ladies' Home Journal and Saturday Evening Post are published, and John Wannamaker's large departmental which contains the largest pipe organ in the world. Philadelphia is known as the City of homes from the fact that it contains some 343,000. It has 54 small parks and across the river is the famous Fairmount Park of 3000 acres in which the Centennial Exhibition of 1876 was held. We enjoyed a ride along the magnificent River Drive in the park.

Washington, the beautiful capital of the United States and one of the cleanest cities in America, was our next stop. Its broad streets and fine residential properties stand out in great contrast to the crowded residence of New York. The White House, the magnificent Capitol Building and Congressional Library are beautiful examples of architecture, being largely of marble and granite. From the top of the famous Washington Monument (555 ft.) a beautiful view was had in every direction. A delightful trip was made across the river to the beautiful estate of George Washington, known as Mount Vernon. Here the old home is preserved and the view from the high ground among the Virginia Hills is entrancing. In a beautiful tomb on the estate, Washington and his wife Martha are buried.

Before leaving for home the dealers expressed their appreciation by presenting to Mr. Frost a beautiful umbrella, and canes to Messrs. Page, Smith and Morris.
