Hicks' Forecasts--

December

A regular storm period covers the 5th to the 9th central on the 6th. Winter solstice, and Mars and Venus periods all bear on this period. A very low barometer at this time should be regarded as positive warning of severe winter storms. These storms will cover most parts of the country, accompanied by thunder, lightning and wind, especially in the south. But about the new moon on the 8th, look for change to blizzardous conditions from the northwest, followed by a fierce cold wave which will penetrate far to the south and east. A decided seismic period lies from the 5th to the 11th, central on the 8th.
