



BANK FOR WOMEN. German Institution is Also Run by

Women. good many people waste sleep for fear that women are going to stop being women as they fare forth into new paths, while nature, "with perfect econ-emy," is turning everything to account. They need assurance and reassurance that what women are asking for is the chance to be women, not little men (no chance to be women, not little men (no matter through what channels of activity their being may come to expression. These uneasy ones would be gladdened if their eyes could rest upon the "Mutual Bank for Self-Supporting Women" in Berlin. Cut flowers stand on the desks, green plants adorn the sills, and sheer white muslin curtains are hung at the windows. The "feminine touch" is everywhere. In becoming business people, the women who run the bank—there are no women who run the bank—there are no men in it—have not ceased to be wo-

men.

This bank is said to be the only one in the world financed and conducted en-tirely by women. It was founded in 1910 to enable self supporting girls and women to obtain such pecuniary accommodations as have long been at the disposal of men. Dear Mr. Editor:

It would take more space than you can spare to tell of the good work done by the Hospital for Sick Children, Toronto, for the sick and deformed children of this Province. Let me, in a few words, tell you of the steady growth of this hospital.

In the year 1875 there were onl cots and beds, one nurse, 44 in-patients Brimming over with useful information for beginners and old hands. Makes a very acceptable and instructive Christmas gift. SAMPLE COPY UPON RE
cots and beds, one nurse, 44 in-patients and 67 out-patients. In 1912 there were patients and 17,862 out-patients.

During the 37 years of the hospital's existence, 19.370 in-patients have been admitted, and 133,714 out-patients have been treated, a total of 153,094, or an average of 4.138 per year. Of the 19,370 patients were cured, and 5,711 were inproved. This is a great record.

Of the 1,294 in-patients last year, 341 came from 218 places outside of Toronto, so that the hospital is not a local but a Provincial institution.

In the orthopedic department in 37 years, nearly 700 boys and girls have been treated for clubfeet, and about 600 were corrected. Half of these came from places outside of Toronto, so surev we have a fair claim for help from the people of this Province.

The Corporation of Toronta grants \$25,000, not only for the city children. but towards the maintenance of all pa tients in the hospital, and the citizens of Toronto donate an average of \$15,000 annually to the funds of the hospital. Will you, kind reader, think of what your money will do! It helps to restore health and strength, and gives sound limbs and straight feet to crippled boys and girls.


