

Every year in Canada many women and hildren are burned to death by fire from hristmas candles.

Don't decorate your Christmas tree with paper, cotton, celluloid or any other inflammable material. Use metallic, tinsel and other non-inflammable decorations only, and set the tree securely so that the children, in reaching for things cannot tip it over.

Don't use cotton to represent snow. If you must have snow use asbestos fibre. it will not burn and looks just as nice. Don't permit children to light or re light the candles while parents or guard ians are not present. They frequently set fire to their clothing instead. Don't light a single candle until everything is ready for the children to come in.

Don't leave a lighted tree unwasched. Don't remove a thing from the tree until the candles are all blown out Don't let the tree stand long after Xmas
