

WHERE COLD STORAGE HURTS

(Montreal Herald.)

It is very pleasant, no doubt, to be able to put away large stocks of butter into cold storage when butter can be obtained for twenty cents a pound and to take it out of cold storage when it can sold for forty cents a pound. As the banks will lend on warehouse receipts fifteen of the original twenty cents, it is possible to make a profit of fifteen, or maybe twenty cents a pound on butter en an original real investment of five or six cents, and when one is able to do that he cannot complain very much. But what is to be said of the case of a man whose wages are so small and whose family so large that the bulk of his weekly expenditure is for food, and whose food supply is limited to the most elementary products, such as bread and butter and eggs and meat and vegetables. Ten cents a dozen too much for eggs, ten cents a pound too much for butter, anything at all that is too much for meat or vegetables, brings this man and his family directly in view of the problem of

SEED DISTRIBUTION.

By instructions of the Hon. Minist of Agriculture a distribution of superior sorts of grain and potatoes will be made during the coming winter and spring to Canadian farmers. The samples for general distribution will consist of spring wheat (5 lbs.) ,white oats (4 lbs.), barley (5 lbs.) and field peas (5 lbs.) These will be sent out from Ottawa. A distribution of potatoes (in 3 lb. samples) will be carried on from several of the experimental farms, the Central farm at Ottawa supplying only the provinces of Ontario and Quebec. All samples will be sent free, by mail.

Applicants must give particulars in regard to the soil on their farms, and some account of their experience with such kinds of grain (or potatoes) as they have grown, so that a promising sort for their conditions may be selected.

Each application must be separate and must be signed by the applicant. Only one sample of grain and one of plications on any gind of printed form potatoes can be sent to each farm. Apcannot be accepted. If two are more samples are asked for in the same letter only one will be sent.

As the supply of seed is limited, farmers are advised to apply early; but the applications will not necessarily be filled in the exact order in which they are received. Preference will always be given to the most thoughtful and explicit requests. Applications received after the end of January will probably be too late.

All applications for grain (and applications from the provinces of Ontario and Quebec for potatoes) should be addressed to the Dominion Cerealist, Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa. Such applications require no postage. If otherwise addressed delay and disappointment may occur.

Applications for potatoes from farmers in any other province should be addressed (postage prepaid) to the Superintendent of the neares) t Branch Experimental Farm in that province.-J. H. Griedale, Director, Dominion Experimental Farm.

SHELTER FOR HOMELESS.

The new scheme for providing shelters for the homeless poor in Central London will apply in its first stages only to the area between the Embankment and Oxford street, and from Vauxhall Bridge Road to the Temple, but if it proves successful its scope will be widened. The commissioner of Police is ar-

ranging that constables on night duty shall carry tickets to be handed to homeless persons in need, coming under their notice. The tickets are to be small and simple of form, containing directions to apply at an office which is to be opened at the Metropolitan Asylums Board in the West Central neighborhod. Here there will be an officer in attendance, who will ring up shelters and casual wards to ascertain whether there is room for the holders of the tickets.

The office will be opened at night, and the applicants will be sent from there to the shelters or central wards most suited to them, where they will be sure of admission. Arrangements will also be made for the reception of homeless people for the night at number of co-operating voluntary institutions.—London Daily Graphic.
