Don't bother killing off the two-year-old hens. Eat the pullets instead; they will taste nicer. The price of butter might suddenly fall during the winter time. Don't bother looking after the notes as they come due. It doesn't do for a farmer's credit to be too good. Don't bother fixing the pump up properly for winter. If it freezes, the animals can lick snow just as well as not; they have plenty of time. Don't bother spreading any fine manure over the garden during December. There will be sure to be heaps of spare time during next Spring's seeding. Don't bother attending the annual meeting of the agricultural society or the creamery. The idea of taking an interest in community betterment is all bosh and nonsense. Don't bother taking your wife with you on that trip this winter. You can tell her all about the folks when you return. Don't bother sending the bigger boys and girls to school. They could do a pile of work at home. Don't bother renewing for your farm paper before the subscription expires. If the publisher stops sending it for awhile it will be more appreciated when it starts. The winter evenings are no time for reading, anyway.—Nor-west Farmer.

Disappointed Veterans.

The placing of the Fenian Raid bounty law on the statute book was welcomed by many veterans, to whom its working has so far brought only disappointment. Old men who sorely need the money watch the mails for the cheque that comes not, and the sadness settles down the heavier on their spirits when they see that cheques are arriving for more fortunate applicants. It is impossible not to be deeply moved by the patience of a brave, uncomplaining old man in need returning from the post-office day after day without the letter he had set his heart on receiving. Yet if his claims are not duly certified on if it is found that the Act does not cover his case, how can anybody be blamed? To defend their country in 1866 and 1870 volunteers donned their uniforms and awaited orders, which some of them received, to go to the front. Those volunteers were not at that time aged men, but were fine, lusty, manful young fellows, the peers of the Canadians who are enjoying their prime and giving orders to Governments to-day. The men who held themselves in readiness to march or take train or boat for the front at the time of the raids were as willing to risk their lives as those who actually did risk their lives. If the law as it stands does not provide for the cases of all who responded to the call and held themselves under orders in 1866 and 1870, we hope it will be amended so as to be made thus comprehensive. We are sure that under Colonel Hughes red tape will not be allowed to stand in the way of a veteran's getting his grant. It is not always possible for a man to get his claim verified by a comrade, and in some instances companies were called out that were not at the time incorporated in a battalion. In dealing with old men, many of whom are little accustomed to the forms of business, some relaxing of official rigor is perhaps necessary. At all events, it would be excused in this case, for the veterans who draw a blank in the Government distribution have the sympathy of all who know them.
