By-Law to Increase Tavern License

A By-law made in pursuance of Section 11, of Chapter 47, of the Statutes of Ontario 1906, and the Consolidated Municipality Act of 1908 to provide for the increase of the duties to be paid for Tavern Licenses in the Village of Jarvis, in the County of Haldimand.

WHEREAS the Municipal Council of the Village of Jarvis deems it advisable to increase the duties to be paid for tavern licenses, in the said village, beyond the amount provided for in Section 10, Chapter 47, Statutes of Ontario 1906.

THEREFORE the Municipal Council of the Village of Jarvis enacts as follows:—

I. That the duties to be paid for a Tavern License, in the said Village of Jarvis, be increased one hundred (\$100) over and above the amount provided by Sec. 10, Chapter 47, Statutes of Ontario 1906.

II. That on Tuesday, the 27th day of February, 1912, at the Council Chamber, in the Village of Jarvis, in the County of Haldimand, between the hours of nine a.m. and five p.m., a poll shall be held for the taking of votes in this By-law.

III. That on the 27th day of February, 1912, at the hour of 8:30 o'clock, p.m., the Clerk of the Council will attend at Council Chamber to sum up the number of votes given for and against the By-law.

IV. That on the 20th day of February 1912, at the hour of 8:30 o'clock p.m., the Reeve shall attend at Council Chamber to appoint persons to attend at the polling place, and at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk respectively, on behalf of the persons interested in promoting or opposing the passing of the By-law respectively.

Take Notice that the above is a true copy of a proposed By-law which has been taken into consideration and which will be finally passed by the Municipal Council of the Village of Jarvis, (in the event of the assent of the electors being obtained thereon) after one month from the 31st day of January, 1912, which is the date of the first publication of the said By-law, and that at the time, day and place therein fixed for taking the votes of the electors, the polls will be held.
