Lendon Truth, the editor of which died the other day, has made several attacks on the Colonian Intelligence League, a society for promoting emigration of girls of the educated classes, in connection with the experiences of five ladies, as Sruit-pickers at Lorne Park and Grimsby. It should be pointed out, says the London Star, that the gravamen of Truth's complaint is that some ladies were insufficiently informed, if not deceived, before they left England, as to the nature of the work, the rate of their Day, and the provision for their housing.

Another party of seven young ladies were also despatched to Lorne Park under the auspices of the League by the same boat. These seven were sent in one party to another farm. Says "Frrom what I can gather the experience of the members of the larger party of seven were not very much better. They found that the conditions of life had not been made clear to them that there was not the slightest possibil-ity of their earning the wages which had been promised, and they were forced to take whatever situations were forthcoming." What eventually happened to them does not transpire, but the original party of five is thus accounted for: "Three of them have now returned to this country. The dairy expert, who threw up a position worth \$500 a year, has taken a situation as cook, while the lady with the medical training is practising as a masseuse in Hamilton.

The League's Secretary, in a letter to "Truth." makes a point of the fact that "all these five ladies had, at their own request, received loans from the league to defray the whole of their expenses to Canada, and one, the "masseuse" spoken of, has since received a further loan to pay her fare from Optario to British Co-lumbia, where she had a promise of pre-fessional employment. Beetles That Grew Mushrooms. Scientists have known of mushroom growing ants for a long time and it was generally believed that the ant was the only insect possessing sufficient intelligence to make a successful mushroom farmer. Prof. J. Bouverie, the French entomologist, has found that a certain wood-boring beetle known as the bostrychide is as familiar with mushroom cuitivation for home consumption as the ant.

Prof. Bouverie discovered that the beeties bere holes in wood and half fill them with a prepared fungus which makes an ideal mushroom bed. The garden is carefully spawned and tended and in course of time the mushrooms appear. In this way the beetle provides itself with a food sufficiently tender for its feeble jaws .--Chicago Tribune.





#### PRUSSIA'S BUDGET.

A printed statement has been issued a Berlin of the Prussian estimates for the new fiscal year. The budget is made to belance at \$1,075,360,560, an increase over the last budget of \$53,751,815.

There is a deficiency in the estimated revenue of about \$4,750,000, which, however, is a reduction from last year, when the income was \$9,975,000 short. The de ficiency is to be covered by a loan. According to the estimates direct taxation is expected to produce about \$4, ation is expected to produce about \$1,-650,000 more than a year ago. In addition to the regular budget the Diet is to be asked to grant a further special credit of \$47,500,000 for the development of the existing railways of the State. This amount of course is to be raised by loan.


