The usual reason is re sponsible—the advanced and rapidly advancing price and if the increase levied on a bag of " murphies " continues, pretty soon the millionaires will do with that commodity for one meal only. At the present time the price demanded is \$1.70 to \$1.75 a bag and the farmers claim that the limit has not been reached. The supply is small and consequently the asco will be continued until the most striking question at a boarding house meal will be: Will you have a potatoe, or have you had one? The price is now the highest that has been recorded even during years when the supply was small. In 1905 it will be remembered there was a great scarcity and the consumer believed that the limit had been reached when the price was raised to \$1.10 to \$1.25. For the succeeding several years normal conditions prevailed again and it was believed that though many other products would be too expensive for the average man, potatoes would be the poor man's food. Only two years ago the price was but 60c to 75c. a bug, but since that time to the present day a steady advance has taken place and the price is not nearly three times the figure that prevailed in 1910. "Where will it end?" is a question frequently ordinary people swearing off potatoes and confirming their attentions to bread and vater—at least until the new crop begins
