### Reminiscences of the Fenian Raid

By Capt. W. M. Alderson, continued from Feb. 7.

We soon landed on shore at Port Dalhousie and we (The Cavalry) were headed on our march. Many were there to see us on shore, for there was great excitement in and around the town. The soldiers, who had fought at Ridgeway, had arrived with the sad news that several of the Queen's Own had been killed and that the Fenians were marching on Port Dalhousie and would soon arrive if they were not driven back. We were no sooner in the cars and the doors closed than we were whisked off for Port Robinson as rapidly as two locomotives could take us. Ladies stood in their ways waving handkerchiefs in token of joy that the Fenians would have to cease their depredations. We were soon at Port Robinson, were detained and man and horse fed. I went to a tailor and had the insignia of my rank (Lance Corporal) placed on my arms with white velvet. I was quite certain then that I could defeat at least half dozen of the Fenians. Soon we were marching toward Chippewa there we got our horses out and ground our swords. We then pushed on to New Germany where Col. Pascooke was in camp, having about 1800 men; they were just about to move and our troop was ordered to push on to the front and form the Advance Guard. We marched about three hours, it being about dark and some Fenians were in sight, running towards the woods. We went back a few hundred yards and were ordered to sleep in our camp. We went into a ploughed field and stood very quietly with their heads down. I laid down on the ploughed earth and fell asleep; woke up in about two hours and felt chilly and damp. Some fence rails were nearby and after placing six side by side, stretched myself out on them, wound the halter chain around my wrist so my horse could not stray away, and notwithstanding the fact that I had slept on softer couches, was soon asleep. About two o'clock I was awakened by some one calling "Corporal" and on opening my eyes beheld Major Dennison (now Police Magistrate of Toronto) and his brother Fred. The Major said: "Corporal, we have not had a wink of sleep all night and we were up all last night. I wish you would hold our horses and let us take a nap." I replied, "All right," and I had three halter chains to hold instead of one. Well, I was very weary and sleep I would, so I fastened two chains to my left leg below the knee, just below the ankle, and soon I had forgotten all about the Fenians. About daylight the Major returned and took the horses, thanked me very much and ordered my wrist in about ten minutes our bugler blew "We had no supper and now we were to go without our breakfast. I mounted and was riding toward the road where my comrades were forming line. When passing a camp fire I saw a soldier roasting a piece of beef on a stick and he pulled it out and held it toward me and said "take it comrade, you must be hungry." I demurred, he said he could get more and that it might be a long time before I would get any food. I accepted it, and although black as a coal, I never tasted sweeter meat. I have never forgotten that man's kind act and I have thanked him in my heart numberless times. He belonged to the 16th Regulars and I often wonder if he is still alive. Soon we were on the march and after riding about four miles we met a man on horseback, who said he had been taken prisoner by the Fenians and had been put in a room of a farm house the night before and four guards placed over him. About midnight the guards in exploring the cellar for provisions found some wine and it being very good they imbibed and the prisoner escaped and took one of the horses and turned the others loose. He said there were several hundred Fenians encamped at the Old Fort. Our Major said "Who will take a despatch to the General." I said I would. The man who had been prisoner said, "Young man, you take your life in your hands, as the woods are full of Fenians and the bridges are burned." I replied that I was no better than another and if I got my hide full of lead, all right. I got the despatch and started. (Will have to leave the rest for a future number.)

### New Teachers

The following number have been licensed by the Department of Education, Toronto:—The Minister of Education, in announcing that about 1,100 highly qualified Public School teachers will graduate from the Normal Schools and Teachers' College from the Normal Schools and Teachers' College at the end of the current session. Of the teachers on the second list holding Standard Class certificates, which at least one year's previous experience, will be available immediately after next August. The remaining 900 holding First and Second Class certificates, will be available in September. Of this latter number approximately 100 will have had, in addition, a course at Queen's, University of Toronto, in Normal Training or Educational Science. All of the 1,100 have pledged themselves to teach in Ontario for at least the first year of their teaching experience and under the Regulations are entitled to the preference over teachers with lower class certificates. The Minister requests that trustees will give due consideration to the above facts in fixing the vacancies which may occur in schools, and take such steps as may seem desirable to the best available teachers.

### New Gaming Act

A barrier upon gambling transactions not actually accompanied by a transfer of cash has been imposed by the new Gaming Act, which has just come from the Statute revision committee. One clause provides that every contract or agreement by way of gaming or wagering shall be null and void, and that no suit may be brought for recovery of any sum of money or thing of value alleged to be won in any wager or which has been deposited in the hands of a third person. Such a clause has, however, no reference to any subscription toward a prize for a lawful game. Another provision is that no promise expressed or implied to pay any money or thing of value in connection therewith, shall be valid. Moreover any person who loses \$40 or over at any one sitting at cards or dice table can under the amended Gaming Act, sue and recover the money lost.
