From its location and importance it was an escepially fitting centre for His labors. Sabbath day—The Jewish Sabbath. The synagogue—A place of worship for the Jews. This one was built by the centurion whose servant Jesus healed a little later. Synagogues were built in the various cities where Jesus dwelt. Authority-Christ's authority did not come from His having been trained in the schools of the rabbis, but from His inherent wisdom, power and love, and from the spirit which He manifested. His divinity clothed Him with authority. Not as the scribes They were sometimes called doctors. Their duty was to copy and explain the law and the traditions of the elders. They simply repeated what the rabbis before them had said. 23. A man with an unclean spirit-
