Wicks' Forecasts for March

A regular storm period will develop and run into regular course from the 4th to the 7th inclusive. The full moon falls on the 3rd, and the course of the Mercury period on the 5th. The main influence will express itself in the early part of March, hence look for very low barometer, followed by heavy snows, on the 4th, 5th, 6th and 7th—first in the west, shifting regularly eastward, with possible lightning and thunder and rain first, followed west by general and damaging sleet, and possibly snow blockades. A cold wave will follow blizzardous storms from the northwest, calling for timely provisions against exposure and danger to man and beast. A very decided seismic impulse will be felt in many places, within a period of seven days, central on the 3rd—watch telegraphic reports.
