By-Law to Increase Tavern License

A By-law made in pursuance of Section 11, of Chapter 47, of the Statutes of Ontario 1908, and the Consolidated Municipality Act of 1908 to provide for the increase of the duties to be paid for Tavern Licenses in the Village of Jarvis, in the County of Haldimand.

WHEREAS the Municipal Council, of the Village of Jarvis deems it advisable to increase the duties to be paid for Tavern Licenses, in the said Village, beyond the amount provided for in Section 10, Chapter 47, Statutes of Ontario 1908.

THEREFORE the Municipal Council of the Village of Jarvis enacts as follows:

I. That the duties to be paid for a Tavern License, in the said Village of Jarvis, be increased one hundred (\$100) over and above the amount provided by Sec. 10, Chapter 47, Statutes of Ontario, 1908.

II. That on Tuesday, the 27th day of February, 1912, at the Council Chamber, in the Village of Jarvis, in the County of Haldimand, between the hours of nine a.m., and five p.m., a poll shall be held for the taking of votes in this By-law.

III. That on the 27th day of February, 1912, at the hour of 8:30 o'clock, p.m., the Clerk of the Council, will attend at the Council Chamber to sum up the number of votes given for and against the By-law.

IV. That on the 20th day of February 1912, at the hour of 8:30 o'clock p.m., the Reeve shall attend at Council Chamber to appoint persons to attend at the polling place, and at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk respectively, on behalf of the persons interested in and promoting or opposing the passing of the By-law respectively.

Take Notice that the above is a true copy of a proposed By-law which has been taken into consideration and which will be finally passed by the Municipal Council, of the Village of Jarvis, (in the event of the assent of the electors being obtained thereto) after one month from the 31st day of January, 1912, which is the date of the first publication of the said By-law, and that at the time, day and place therein fixed for taking the votes of the electors, the polls will be held.

Milk and Butter Tests

The Holstein Friesian heifer Netherland Beauty Pouch No. 11047. The property of W. H. Cherry, Garnet, has just completed a fine seven day official record. She freshened on December 2nd, 1911, at two years 10 and 7 days of age, which made the 2nd calf she gave birth to in 1911 having previously freshened on January 21st 1911. She was taken to the Dairy Show at Guelph where 5 days after freshening in the three day list she won 3rd place giving 166.6 lbs of milk in 3 days testing 3.7% an average of 55.6 lbs. per day. On the 23rd of Jan. 1912 just 61 days after calving she commenced a seven day official record and produced 455.2 lbs of milk and 22.08 lbs of butter from the 23rd until 29th inclusive her average was 22.24 lbs per day, best day's milk 23.8, Levi Smith, O. A. C. Superintendent of list.
