June 17th, 1912.
Council met pursuant to adjournment, all members were present.

The minutes of the former meeting were read.

Pyle-Buckner.—That the minutes be adopted as read.—Carried.
The following communications were read:—From Thomas Laidlaw, David Seymour, Provincial Winter Fair, Mercantile Trust Co., Department of Education, Ontario Municipal Association, J. I. Case Threshing Machine Co., Ontario Good Roads Association, Mercantile Trust Co., Treasurer's statement, list of land liable to be sold for taxes.

Roulston-Young.—That Messrs. McBurney, Avery and Holmes be a Committee on Communications.—Carried.
Pyle-Buckner.—That we do now adjourn to allow the different committees to meet.—Carried.

Brooks-Walton.—That this Council do now resume business with the Warden in the chair.—Carried.
Young-Buckner.—That leave be given to introduce a bill to authorize Henry J. Pyle to make the affidavit on the Bill of Sale given by Berton Phillips and that the bill be read a first time.—Carried.

Report of the County Roads Committee.
To the Members of the County Council.
Gentlemen.—Your Committee beg leave to report as follows: A meeting was held in the Superintendent's office in Dunnville on June 4th at which tenders were received for spreader wagons, your committee decided to purchase five spreader wagons from the Hamilton Machinery Company at a cost of \$49.00 and five from the Sawyer-Massey Co. at a cost of \$702.50. Your Committee visited the Phillips quarry in Byng, under option to the County, and decided to purchase the same for \$500

and also the fifteen portable spreader for \$1,000.00; the deed and bill of sale accompanies this report. Your Committee recommend that the matter of having the employees on the County road system insured be looked into.

Your Committee recommend that a by-law to prohibit the dumping of rubbish on the County roads with a penalty for violation thereof be passed. Your Committee have to report that construction was started at Hagersville to-day and that it is expected that construction will start at Byng shortly. Your Committee recommend that the sum of \$250.00 be placed to the credit of Alan Blair Jackson, County Superintendent, in the bank to enable him to make emergency purchases. High School Investigation.

To the Warden and Members of the County Council.
Gentlemen.—Your Committee, appointed to investigate the accounts of maintenance of the four High Schools of the County, beg leave to report as follows: We have examined the books of the different High Schools for the years 1906, 1907, 1908, 1909, 1910 and 1911 and find all correct except those of Caledonia High School, in which some errors were discovered in the years 1906, 1907, 1908, 1909, amounting to \$985.20 of which amount Haldimand contributed as nearly as we can arrive at it by average, \$615.75 over correct amount. Your Committee respectfully suggests and recommends that all High Schools should use books of similar form and heading for the different accounts of maintenance and that all reports of such accounts should be accompanied by affidavit when sent to the County Council.—Respectfully, J. J. Parsons, David McBurney, Ivan W. Holmes.

Roulston-Young.—That the report of the Committee to inquire into the accounts of the several High Schools be adopted as read.—Carried.

Grants re County Roads.
To the Warden and Council of the County of Haldimand.

Sirs.—Your Committee appointed to consider the grants to be made to various municipalities and the township of Sherbrooke from the moneys raised on sale County Roads debentures beg to report:

1. Upon consideration it appeared to your Committee that if the grants were discontinued at present for an interest rate for present payment, the rate would be that those municipalities would pay double interest for they will be charged through the currency of the debentures with sums to repay not only principal but interest as well.

2. Your Committee would prefer the Council to consider this view of the matter and direct your Committee as to their conclusion before proceeding to estimate what they may consider proper sums to make those municipalities as grants. Respectfully submitted.—J. J. Parsons, Chairman.

Bain-Parsons.—That a further sum of \$7,000 be taken up on the credits obtained by the County from the Canadian Bank of Commerce, and that the Warden and

Treasurer sign a note for the same — Carried.

McBurney, Pyle.—That the Warden issue a warrant for the sale of lands or arrears of taxes in the County of Haldimand.—Carried.

Pyle-Buckner.—That we do now adjourn to allow the County Roads Committee to meet.—Carried.

Avery-Patton.—That the bill for the equalized assessment of the County of Haldimand be read a second time.—Carried.
Young-Buckner.—That leave be given to fix the equalized assessment to the County for the year 1912 be read a third time, signed, sealed and numbered as in the original motion.—Carried.

Holmes-Brooks.—That this Council advance the sum of \$60.00 to each High School and a \$5 to the accounts of Mr. Sovey, \$5.50 and Peter Murphy, \$1.50, be paid.—Carried.

Parsons-Holmes.—That Messrs. Bain and Pyle, and the County Engineer secure from Messrs. Anderson and Anderson insurance on the County Good Roads employees.—Carried.

Parsons-Bain.—That no action be taken by this Council regarding grant to Ontario Winter Fair Association.—Carried.

McBurney-Holmes, andes lved.—That this Council approve of the recent amendments to the Act respecting the improvement of public highways, and would respectfully suggest that in arranging for the expenditure of the proposed Dominion A. to be, by-law, provision be made for increased or under the Highway Improvement Act, and for other additional aid on leading County roads to be spent in accordance with spirit of it as determined by the Public Works Department, also that we approve of the Provincial Government paying a percentage of cost of maintenance of County Road and the Clerk forward a copy of this to Secretary of Good Roads Association.—Carried.

Holmes-Bain.—That the report of the Special Committee on Village grants for County Roads be adopted as read.—Carried.

McBurney-Holmes.—That leave be given to introduce a bill to make grants to the various towns and villages in the County of Haldimand from the sale of County debentures for the purpose of the improvement of the streets within cities, towns and villages as burnt up by fire or connections between roads owned by the County as directed by the bill be read a first time.—Carried.

Pyle-Buckner.—That Mr. McBurney be granted three months' leave of absence from County Council to date from August 15th, 1912.—Carried.

Holmes-Brooks.—That our Clerk communicate with the County Clerk of Haldimand and ascertain how they have dealt with the urban municipalities regarding grants of County Good Roads money.—Carried.

Pyle-Buckner.—That we do now adjourn to meet by a call of the Warden.—Carried.

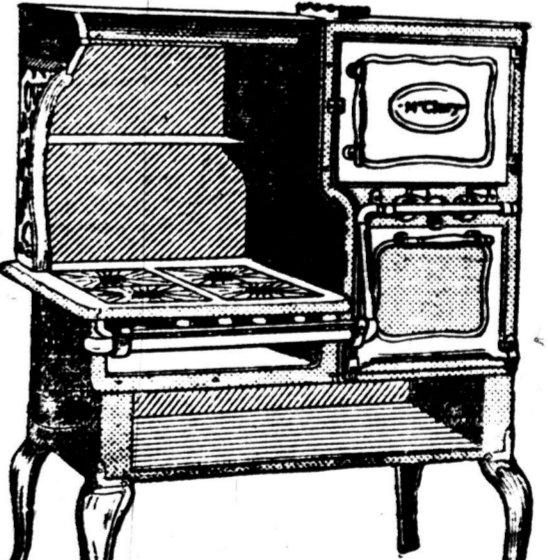
