Fish Scarcity

The commission of conservation on fisheries has memorialized the Dominion government to take emergency measures in the planting of whitefish fry to prevent the "steady depletion" of the supply of such fish in Canadian waters. The catch of whitefish in the whole Dominion has risen from nine to eleven million in the last twenty years, but this is due to the development of new fisheries in the west. In Lake Huron and Georgian Bay, which were formerly our chief reservoir of "America's finest food fish," the yield is now only one-third of what it was twenty years ago. The condition of affairs in these waters the commissioners regard as really startling. The best remedy is the planting of whitefish fry on a much larger scale than has yet been attempted.

Death of Mrs. Poole

A well known figure in Walpole passed away in the person of Mrs. Mary Poole, who died on July 24th. Deceased was born 91 years ago at Cappoquin Co., Waterford, Ireland, from which place she removed to Jersey Channel Islands. Here she married Michael Poole to whom she bore nine children, her husband dying in 1884. She came to Canada, settling at Nanticoke, on the farm so well known as "Hickory Grove". Here she lived until the spring of 1907. The funeral took place from the residence of her daughter Mrs. C. F. Kinchular, Woodhouse, on Friday the 26th July, to St. Mary's church Simcoe, where a solemn Requiem Mass was sung by Rev. Father Nagle, interment taking place at St. Mary's church. She leaves to mourn her loss, four sons Robert, Patrick and Thomas of Chicago, Michael J. of Toronto, and one daughter Mrs. C. F. Kinchular. Deceased was an exemplary Christian and a loving and devoted mother. She commanded the high esteem of her neighbors many of them following her mortal remains to their last resting place.

Hicks' Forecasts-August

A regular storm period is central on the 1, covering July 30, to August 4. By the 2, the barometer will fall to marked storm conditions in western and central regions, the temperature will rise to great warmth, and storms of lightning, thunder, wind and rain will break into very violent gusts, and gales in many localities, as the general storm area passes eastwardly across the country. The Venus influence will be strong at this time, the vicious electrical storms, with hail in northwestern regions, will be unseasonably cool for two or three days. Local cloudbursts will most likely occur here and there, in central to eastern states, but there will be great shortage in widely distributed rains. A reactionary storm period has its central days on the 7th, 8th and 9th. At this time the thermometer will again rise to very high temperatures, the barometer will fall, and black threatening storm clouds, with probability of violence, will pass from west to east over the country. Great bluster and threatening thunder may be looked for, but raids will probably not prove as copious and general as needed. Another break in the temperature will give temporary respite from summer heat about the 9th, 10th and 11th.

Cross Eyed Men Barred

Ottawa, July 26—Men who squint or are cross-eyed can no longer become engineers, firemen, trainmen or brakemen on Canadian railways. Following its recent judgment the Railway Commission had issued a series of uniform rules governing the determination of visual acuity, color perception and hearing of railway employees, and among them is a clause barring the squinting or cross-eyed men. This is not the only defect barred. Applicants must not be accepted if they use glasses for near vision, though when the distant vision of an employe can be improved by good glasses their use is encouraged. Color blindness is also barred, and good hearing powers are stringently insisted upon. Applicants must be able to hear and repeat names and numbers spoken in a conversational tone at a distance of twenty feet. Employes must be re-examined in all these particulars after any illness or accident which might have affected them, as before promotion.

Harvest Great Laborers Few

The most formidable obstacle now in the way of the Canadian farmer and his bank visits this fall is the facilities for turning the swaying wheat into money. Two problems now present themselves—how will enough men be obtained to harvest the crop, and where will the cars and locomotives come from necessary to carry record yield to its proper markets? The railways have promised that transportation facilities in the west will be much improved this autumn and some have gone so far as to say that no car shortage will occur. The majority of the farmers who are face to face with conditions on the prairie find the labor scarcity, therefore, cause for the more immediate concern. Last season in spite of its light crops, gave unfortunate experiences to many farmers who had to look to transients to take in the harvest. The prospects for an unusually heavy yield this summer render the labor outlook still more acute. A number of persons in close touch with the crop situation in the west have estimated the number of helpers needed. Some put the figures at 50,000, others nearer 70,000 and one authority declares 100,000 men are required. Ontario and the east will suffer almost as greatly as the west for crop help, particularly if the usual number of laborers join the cheap excursions.
