The Revolver

Frank Truckle, with a revolver, killed his wife a few days ago in the open street in Hamilton, then shot himself dead. Why did Truckle have a revolver? According to the Hamilton papers Truckle was not a man of good reputation—not the sort of man to be entrusted with the possession of a revolver. Why should he have one? He did not require it for self defence. The criminal code of Canada, section 118 provides that no person shall carry a revolver except upon a permit granted by the police magistrate after hearing evidence on oath as to the reasons why permission is sought. The Ontario Legislature has supplemented this by an act providing that no person shall buy a revolver unless when purchasing he presents a permit to the dealer selling the weapon from the chief of police of a city or town, or the superintendent of the provincial police. Thus it is clear, first, that no dealer in firearms can legally sell a pistol to any person who has not a permit from the chief of police; secondly that no chief of police should grant such a permit except on excellent reasons; thirdly that permit or no permit from a chief of police to buy a pistol, no citizen has a right to carry one unless he also gets a permit from a police magistrate after giving good reason. All this puts a good deal of the revolver evil up to the chief of police and police magistrates. If these do their full duty the evil and danger must be considerably minimized.

A Reactionary Storm Period falls on the 11th 12th and 13th, precisely at the crisis of electric and magnetic excitement.
