Ontario which suffered so severely from drought last year is threatened with corresponding loss this season owing to excess of moisture. Grain seeding, which should have been finished the first week in May, is not yet complete. Corn and Mangrel planting is also being held back. Land on which grain was sown has been flooded, and prospective yields therefrom greatly reduced. While the general crop situation is causing alarm the abundance of pasture and assured a good hay crop, and the fruit outlook, with the possible exception of peaches, is promising.
