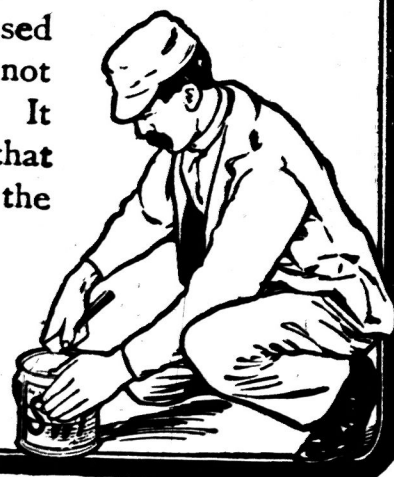

Engines Prolong Farmer's Life

"I believe that the gasoline engine has
done more and will do more to prolong
the life of the farmer than any device
that ever has been placed on the market."
declared a man interested in rural pro-
gress, as he was watching the engine
efforts of an engine that was operating
some up-to-date machinery of a Canadian
farm. "The average farmer of today, if
he is past sixty, is pretty apt to be
broken down and looks to be 10 years older
than he really is. Why is it, do you ask?
It is simply because the man has broken
himself down physically through hard
manual labor that is in a large measure
now being done by the gasoline engine.
These machines are being manufactured
so cheaply and substantially that almost
any farmer may own one. If he is not
able to bear all the expenses for this
labor-saving device he may unite with
some neighbor and own one jointly."

Haldimand County Should Act

The Ontario Government is prepared to
bear one third of the expense incurred
by the counties of the province in giving
publicity to their particular agricultural
resources and advantages. At the last
session of the Legislature the estimates
contained an appropriation of \$3,000 for as-
sisting the counties, and the government
has now fixed the terms upon which this
sum shall be distributed. One third of
the money expended by the counties shall
be refunded by the Provincial Treasury,
providing that the total expenditure in
any one year does not exceed \$4,000. The
publication put forth by those in charge
of the work must be submitted for approval
to the County Council and to the Minister
of Agriculture. The publicity scheme for
counties grows out of the step taken by
the county of Lambton last year in issuing
a booklet advertising its many advan-
tages and circulating widely. The De-
partment of Agriculture, appreciating
the importance of such publications in
supplementing the work of the immigra-
tion department in the Old Land, took
steps to dispose of a great many of them
through their agents abroad, and follow-
ed this up by extending an invitation to
other counties to follow suit by providing
financial assistance. Lambton is contin-
uing its publicity campaign, and three
other counties—Essex, Norfolk, and Sim-
coe are discussing the matter.
