Hicks' Forecasts for June

A regular storm period is in progress the last four days in June, central on the 25th. Look for falling barometer, growing cloudiness and areas of rain, wind and thunder on the 28th, 29th and 30th. The Moon is full and at its extreme southern point in the heavens on the 25th. At these solstice full Moons there is greater probability of volcanic outbursts and seismic disturbances. A seismic period covers the 25th to July 4th, central June 29th. Careful readers of the world's telegraphic news will see that general volcanic unrest will prevail from about the middle to the end of June, with frequent earthquake shocks in wide extremes of the globe.
