### Note and Comment

During the year 1911, 2,283 marriage ceremonies took place at Windsor, Ont. Do the wedding fees there go to the ministers' wives as pin money?

The assistant telegraph operator on the steamship Titanic was paid \$20 a month and board. A good land operator gets from \$25 to \$40 a week, with fewer hours.

After calm consideration we have decided that it is better to stay ten days on the ocean—and get to land ultimately, than to expect to cross in five, and never get there.

An attachment for a telephone receiver by which any third person can hear what is said over a wire, a stenographer witness for instance, has been invented. This will prove handy in the case of evidence under oath being required.

If the wreck of the Titanic is succeeded by universal insistence that every vessel shall be equipped with sufficient lifeboats to accommodate every person on board, one of the biggest risks in the game will have been eliminated, and, to refer to the old adage, a strong lock will have been placed on the stable door.

A Chicago woman sent a pair of shoes to be mended and the shoemaker found concealed in them \$5,000 worth of diamonds. The grateful woman sent him \$1, but whether this was over and above the charge for the half-soleing is not stated. The possibility is that it was, for the shoemaker sent the dollar back.

A New York woman is suing for divorce on the ground that before marriage her husband had served a term in prison, and had not informed her of it. A little while ago a Pennsylvania man asked for a divorce because his wife represented herself to be a widow, thus accounting for her child. Later on he learned that she had not been married, and asked that the marriage be set aside. The judge took the ground that the husband should have satisfied himself as to the woman's past before he married her, and that it would be outrageous to annul marriage contracts because of anything that happened before marriage. The words "for better" "for worse," seem to cover both cases.

It is safe to say that there will be no more of this personal abuse. Mr. Hays will be remembered now as the man who brought about the reconstruction of the Grand Trunk and raised it to the front rank of the transportation systems of the continent. His name will be more highly honored as the true nature of his services comes to be more widely known. He must have been a man of great executive ability of noble powers of vision and of splendid courage, to accomplish all he has done. It is not too much to say that the whole Dominion of Canada has cause to mourn his loss. Those who are privileged to speak from personal acquaintance declare that in his private relations he was a simple, courteous and kindly gentleman.

The high prices which have ruled for apples for the past few years make the farmer's orchard one of the money-makers on the farm. It is very difficult, however, to get farmers to realize this. They have been accustomed so long to look upon the orchard as largely a negligible quantity that they fail to see any good in it, even though the prices for fruit are high. A farmer would consider that if he reaped a harvest of 150 bushels from five acres of wheat and sold it at \$1 a bushel that he was making a very good thing of cropping those five acres. And so he would too, in so far as grain growing is concerned. But let us look into this matter a little. To get that crop of wheat he had to prepare the land, sow the seed, harvest and thrash it, the expense of which must be deducted from his gross returns from the wheat. On the other hand take a five acre orchard of well selected fruit. When the trees come into bearing, they are there to do business every year without any re-planting. The farmer does not have to put in new seed every spring. If he cares for his orchard properly he will have to prune, spray and keep his orchard cultivated and in good shape. Then he will have to pick the apples and prepare them for market. All this will mean some labor and expense. But look at the returns in an average year under average conditions. The profits from some five acre orchards well looked after often equal the returns from a fifty acre farm. Yet the orchard is neglected, and if it produces enough for family use the owner is satisfied.

## Around About Us.

Lydia Kizera, wife of Jos. Baneroff, after an illness of about four months from diabetes, died on Monday, at Tillsonburg. The deceased, who was in her 43rd year, leaves a husband and four children.

The death of Mrs. James C. Brown, took place on Sunday morning after a brief illness of pneumonia. Deceased had been in fairly good health up to within a few days of her death, and a few of her friends were aware of her serious condition until news came of her death.

Arthur Bowlby of Waterford, has been suffering for some time with a sore foot. It became so serious that his physician advised his going to Hamilton to consult a specialist. An operation was decided upon, and the foot was taken off above the ankle. The trouble began as the result of a frost bite last winter.

Mr. George W. Kelley, G. T. R. Deceased who was in his 29th year, had been ill for about a year. Besides his parents, he leaves five brothers and three sisters. The interment was made on Wednesday at Tillsonburg.

A quiet event took place on Wednesday April 24th, at the Church of Precious Blood, Buffalo, N. Y., when Michael T. Leavey of Dunnville, Ont., and Anna E. Simons of Marshville, Ont., were quietly married by the Rev. F. Gleason. Miss Anna M. Quinn of Buffalo, acted as bridesmaid, and Timothy Leavey, brother of the groom, acted as best man. After a short honeymoon, they will reside in Dunnville.

A Courtland correspondent writes: Rev. C. N. Dewey and H. T. Billie of Tillsonburg had a narrow escape from a fatal accident, when returning from a meeting at Conrland Thursday night. They were at the railway crossing when the west bound Wabash express passed through here. They did not realize their danger until they were upon the track, with barely time to get over it. This crossing is regarded as very dangerous, as it is impossible to see a train coming from the north on the track. Many persons think the crossing should be protected, as numerous narrow escapes are reported and there have been three fatalities at this point.

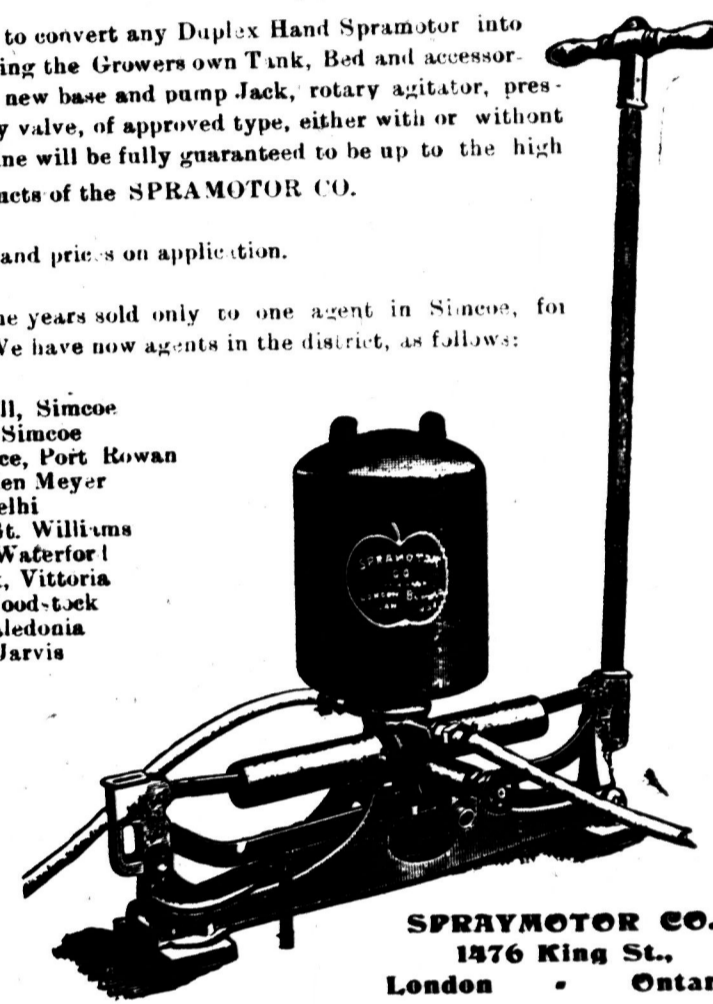

## Changes in Liquor Laws

The amendments which the Ontario Government made recently to the regulations governing the sale of liquor appear to be in the right direction. The storing of liquor in local option districts will be prevented. This is but right, as the purpose in storing liquor in such places is to facilitate its distribution and sale and hamper the successful operation of local option. Another provision enables the Government to prohibit the sale of liquor temporarily in a district under license while a public work is under way. No license holder or his employe will be permitted to accept in payment or to convert into cash any check or time check or order for wages. There are other amendments of minor import.
