The Brotherhood Federation of Canada, Convention May 1912

A committee have been authorized to call upon all Brotherhoods, Bible Classes and other Associations of Christian Men in Canada to appoint representatives to meet in Convention in Toronto, Friday, May 10th, 7.30 p.m., to Monday, 13th, 1912, in Cook's Presbyterian Church, Massey Hall and the Metropolitan Church. The object of the Convention is to effect such a Federation of existing bodies of Christian men as shall, without loss of name or nature, bring them into greater harmony of purpose, freer interchange of thought and more effective co-operation, so that virile Christianity may become characteristic and prevailing in our Canadian life. The Mayor and Council of the City of Toronto have arranged to signalize the occasion by a Civic Banquet to our British Brethren and all out of town delegates. Delegates are requested to secure Standard Certificate when purchasing tickets.

Death of Edgar Brynline

Mr. Edgar Brynline who died at his late home in Townsend on Thursday evening was one of the oldest and most highly respected residents of the district. He had been ill for six months or so and death to him a welcome one. He was born in Charlottetown in July, 1831 where he lived until his removal to Walpole in 1864. At the age of 21 he was baptized by Rev. Abraham Smith and united with the Forestville Baptist Church. On removing to Walpole he was made a deacon in the Cheapside Baptist Church and later, on coming to Townsend in 1879, he was in 1883 elected to the same office in the Waterford Baptist church. This office he held to the time of his death and to a marked degree he possessed the respect and confidence of his fellow men. He was a diligent student of religious truth and few men were better versed in the sacred word than he. Until his last illness he was seldom absent from the services of the church. In 1878 he was married to Catharine Collier, who died in March 1908. Of this marriage Mrs. Calvin Beck, who resides on the old homestead, is the sole survivor. He was buried on Sunday afternoon, the service being conducted at the house by his pastor, Rev. F. C. Elliott, assisted by Revs. Moore and Haviland.
