Judge Mabee is Dead

Toronto, May 7.—Hon. James Pitt Ma-
bee, chairman of the Dominion Board of
Railway Commissioners and a former
Judge of the high court of justice of On-
tario, died at St. Michael's hospital at
3.15 yesterday afternoon. He was oper-
ated on Tuesday for appendicitis. The
aged physician was found to be in a gangrenous
condition. Paralysis of the bowels set in
and a second operation was performed,
which left the patient very low and from
which he succumbed on the above day.
Mr. Mabee was of United Empire Loyal-
ist descent, the eldest son of Col. S. P.
Mabee and Frances Leston of Lincoln-
shire, England.
