Hicks' Forecasts for May

A regular storm period central on the 13th, involves the 11th to the 16th. The Moon is on the equator on the 12th, and new on the 16th, which facts indicate that a daily cycle of heavy rain and thunder storms, beginning on the 12th, will most likely continue until after new moon on the 16th. Here, again, the barometer will prove the most reliable and faithful friend. If it drops to low readings about the 11th and 12th, look for severe storms of wind, rain, and thunder to follow, and if the barometer fails to rise and the winds continue from the east and south with continued high temperature, expect storm proxymies to repeat themselves daily. The mid-month seismic period extends from the 12th to the 19th, being centr. on the 26th.

The fall wheat this year will be a total failure according to the statement of men who have travelled through the country the past three weeks. The hay crop will also be a poor one, because of the firmness of the soil which is very lumpy in many places. The continued cold winter is the cause of the failure of the wheat crop, which is said to be in a worse condition now than it has been in a great many years. How to Gather Fish Worms
