### Obituary

This week we are called upon to record the death of one of the oldest residents of Oneida in the person of Mrs. Margaret McCloy, widow of the late Alex. McCloy, who passed away on Thursday at the ripe old age of 90 years. She suffered a paralytic stroke a few weeks ago which terminated fatally. Margaret McCloy was born in Ireland in 1822 and came to Canada when fifteen years of age, settling in Kingston, where she met and married her late husband. They moved to Hamilton and about sixty years ago came to Oneida. At that time there was only one settler between Caledonia and Hagersville and only a wagon track through the woods. The loneliness and privations had little effect upon these brave, hardy pioneers who proceeded to hew a home for themselves out of pathless forest. How well they succeeded the fine farm they left bears eloquent testimony. Her husband predeceased her nineteen years ago. Mrs. McCloy was of a most kind and hospitable nature, a valued neighbor and friend and was greatly esteemed throughout the neighborhood. She was a consistent member of the Anglican Church. She is survived by two daughters and four sons.
