Lewis and Carter that Messrs Booth and Carter be a committee to remove the street light attached to D. F. Aiken's residence, to a suitable place on the opposite side of the street and to procure a suitable lamp and post for the same—Carried.

Carter and Booth that the account of the Jarvis Record for \$12.44 and the accounts of \$68.00 for street lights be accepted and that the Reeve issue cheques for the same—Carried.

Lewis and Booth that John Deming be appointed special Constable for 24th of May, at the usual salary.

Booth and Carter that Council adjourn to meet at call of Reeve—Carried.
