THE BEST WAY

To Overcome Difficulties Encountered

by All Housekeepers. Stored potatoes may be prevented from sprouting and will keep much bet-ter if the earth or ceilar floor on which they rest. Another layer of lime should be added on the pile, at the height of five feet, should they be placed in a bin This treatment not only keeps the petatoes from rotting, but conserves their mealiness.

To remove a rusty screw, apply a hot iron to his head for a few minutes and then remove it in the usual way with a screw-driver. The screw will then come out easily.

To clean stains from bone or ivory

handles on knives, rub them with a soft paste made by mixing whiting with lem-on juice. This should be well rubbed in and then the handles should be rinsed in warm water and dried carefully. To clean white ostrich feathers, make a solution of four ounces of white soap (cut small) and four quarts of rather hot water. Beat this into a lather with a paddle or clean large spoon. Dip the feather in this, and rub it gently but well for five or six minutes. Then wash in clear water as hot as the hands can bear, and shake until dry.




These letters, which are very small capitals, are found upon the reverse of the coins with the exception of the new design double eagle and the Lincolnhead cent, upon which they are on the obverse.

UNIFORMITY IN CANADIAN DAIRY PRODUCTS.

A few months ago there was held at Ottawa a conference of dairy experts and officials from all parts of the Deminion. The meeting was called by the Honorable the Minister of Agriculture for the purpose of endeavoring to perpetuate the uniformity in quality and character of Canadian cheese and butter that has been responsible for the success of Canadian dairying. As pointed out by the dairy and cold storage commissioner, who presided over the conference, many things come up in the practice of dairying over which slight difference of opinion may arise, so that it seems desirable to bring together from time to time those in charge of dairy schools, and the chief instructors, in the various provinces, to discuss methods and practices in order to arrive at some agreement as a body of dairy advisors. The conference lasted two days, during which time many matters of importance were taken up and freely discussed. Some of these were the pasteurization of whey, factory refuse in relation to tuberculosis in logs, testing and grading cream at cream gathering creameries, whey butter, methods of paying patrons of cheese factories, and other subjects relating to the production of butter and cheese. For the information of buttermakers and cheesemakers, and others interested in dairying, there has been printed a verbatim report of the proceedings of this conference. Then she may lead one through other courtyards, all with the usual one-storey rooms around them, and into her secluded garden of rocks and pools, of pretty paths and bridges, of clustering trees and flowers.

In such a palace as this each courtyard, with its surrounding rooms, may be the so-cial home of one, of the sons and his wife and children; but somewhere in the maze of walls, under one of the low, tiled roofs, is the common dining-room, with the Here the men of family eat together twice a day, and afterward the women and children. And somewhere also there is a central family hall, with the ancestral tablets, which must have their tribute of incense at proper seasons. These are held in such reverence that no foot may pass above them, and therefore two-storey dwellings are unknown in regions uncontaminated by foreign influence.-From Harriet Monroe's "The Training of Chinese Children' 'in the March Century.


