Construction Div. No. 39 Road 14
Work on this division has also been seriously hampered by weather and shortage of labor in quarry at Byng. On this road 4-5 of a mile have been completed and grading is complete to 1 1/2 mile stake, cost has been to date \$2,109.90. No. 1 quarry at Byng is being steadily developed and is not yet at best producing stage. Large bin is erected and awaits installation of screen and gears, ordered from J. I. Case Co. Wages since production of first stone was \$1,194.07, for which sum 1645 yards stone have been quarried and crushed making cost of production for wages 72c. Cost materially reduced by installation of proposed hoist and larger bin. Since operations were commenced at Hagersville in middle June, 29 days have been lost by gang owing to wet weather and practically same amount at Div. 39 Road 14. This intermittent stopping of work delays it to a greater extent than is represented by actual loss of days. Contract let for 4 1/2 inch culvert necessary on Div. 12, from 10 to 11th St. and Effinger for \$135. Treasurer to make payment on certificate of completion. Concrete culverts are being absolutely necessary. These come under construction and will be turned part of permanent construction and will entail payment of Government grant. No suitable building has been found for storage of Hagersville plant for winter, would like committees instructions on matter. Would request Council to give matter of a wide tire By-Law serious consideration as soon as possible because it would take a number of years before any By-Law passed would be fully operative. I would also request that further sum be placed to my credit for emergency purposes. Yours faithfully—A. M. Jackson. Report be adopted as read.—Carried.

Late Nathaniel E. Low

Hicks' Forecasts-- November

A reactionary storm period falling on the 8th, 7th and 9th, with new moon on the 9th, threatening weather will continue over from the 5th, bringing a return of falling barometer, change to warmer and increasing rain and wind on and touching the 3rd and 9th. These storms will end in dashes of early snow and change to very much colder, about the 9th, 10th and 11th. From the 12th to the 14th, central on the 8th, natural seismic unrest will be very general and probable. We urge every reader to watch for all telegraphic reports of such phenomena, the world over; keep a record of dates on which earthquakes and storms are reported and prove to yourself and your friends whether or not these things happen in conformity to our theory and forecasts. A regular storm period involves the 11th to the 16th, being central on the 13th. At this period the moon will be at extreme south declination and atmospheric tides will flow from northerly directions, increasing the probability of cold rains and winds, added to snow and sleet over central to northern parts of the country. The Mercury and Venus periods will both be felt in the disturbances of this period, and the end of the month. Storms of this period will culminate on the 13th, 14th, 15th and 16th—first to the west and then progressively, day by day to the eastward. High barometer and change to westerly winds and much colder will push the western banks of the storm centre, all the way to the Atlantic. One of the most important things to know and keep in mind is that rising temperature, falling barometer and colder, clearing weather follow storm.
